### THURSDAY, 11TH APRIL, 1957.

- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute—

Life Insurance Act—Eleventh Annual Report of the Insurance Commissioner, for 1956. River Murray Waters Act—River Murray Commission—Annual Report for year 1955-56.

3. RETIREMENT OF PRINCIPAL PARLIAMENTARY REPORTER.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that Mr. W. J. M. Campbell, Principal Parliamentary Reporter, would retire on the 12th April, and, having referred to his valuable service to the Parliament, wished him well in his retirement.

Several honorable Members associated themselves and their Parties with the good wishes offered.

- SPECIAL ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. H. E. Holt (Minister for Labour and National Service) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Tuesday, the 30th April, at half-past two o'clock p.m. Question—put and passed.
- 5. DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF URGENCY—COAL MINING INDUSTRY.—Mr. James having proposed to Mr. Speaker that a definite matter of urgent public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Government to help in stabilizing the coal mining industry in New South Wales by encouraging the establishment of new industries including those using coal and by not taking other measures to prevent dismissals and unemployment and consequent dislocation of communities"—

Mr. Speaker called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly—

Mr. James addressed the House.

- 7. MATRIMONIAL BILL 1957.—Mr. Joske moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to Marriage and Matrimonial Causes and, in relation thereto, Parental Rights and the Custody of Infants.

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Joske then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Joske moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

8. Excise Bill 1957.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly.
