- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute—

Public Service Act—Appointments—Department— Territories—R. W. R. Miller. Works—R. S. Copping, P. Dickinson.

3. Taxation Administration Bill 1960.—Mr. Holt (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to extend the Term of Office of the Commissioner of Taxation. Question—put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Holt moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

4. PAPUA AND NEW GUINEA BILL 1960.—Mr. Hasluck (Minister for Territories) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to provide for a Guarantee by the Commonwealth in respect of Public Loans in the Territory of Papua and New Guinea.

Question—put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Hasluck moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

5. WHEAT INDUSTRY STABILIZATION BILL 1960.—Mr. Adermann (Minister for Primary Industry) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to the Constitution of the Australian Wheat Board.

Question—put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Adermann moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Pollard), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. Public Works Committee Bill 1960.—Mr. Freeth (Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works.

Question-put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Freeth moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Whitlam), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

7. Address in Reply to the Governor-General's Speech.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to:—

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY-

We, the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament—And on the Amendment moved by Mr. Calwell, viz.:—That the following words be added to the Address:—"but desire to advise Your Excellency that the Government no longer possesses the confidence of the Parliament and of the Nation because of—

- (1) Its failure to halt inflation with its adverse effects on wage and salary earners, on pensioners, on persons on fixed incomes, on primary producers and on home builders, particularly those with young familes;
- (2) Its action in lifting import restrictions with Its accompanying threat to the employment of thousands of Australians and the security of Australian enterprises; and
- (3) Its decision to ask the Arbitration Commission to reject the current application of the trade union movement for an increase in the basic wage "—

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

8. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Roberton (Minister for Social Services) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
