- 4. WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN THE GOVERNMENT.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition), That because the Government's rapidly changing plans have failed to protect and develop the Australian economy and to safeguard our overseas funds and have caused grave confusion, dislocation and hardship to many sections of industry, both primary and secondary, and unnecessary suffering to many citizens, particularly those who have lost their employment, this Government does not possess the confidence of the Parliament or of the Nation-

Suspension of Standing Orders-Extended time for speeches.--Mr. Hasluck (Minister for Territories) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Mr. Holt (Treasurer) and Mr. Whitlam each speaking for a period not exceeding 45 minutes.

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Mackinnon), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
