### WEDNESDAY, 22ND MARCH, 1961.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Petition.—Mr. Uren presented a Petition from certain electors in the States of the Commonwealth praying that the House will give immediate consideration to the increase of social service payments to meet the essential needs of recipients.

Petition received and read.

3. Soviet Request for Surrender of Mr. E. R. A. P. Viks-Ministerial Statement-Motion for PRINTING PAPER.—Sir Garfield Barwick (Acting Minister for External Affairs), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement in regard to the Soviet request for the surrender of Mr. E. R. A. P. Viks, because of certain alleged war crimes, and the reasons for which the Government had refused the request. Sir Garfield Barwick then, by command of His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth, laid upon the Table the following Paper:-

Soviet Request for Surrender of Mr. E. R. A. P. Viks-Ministerial Statement.

Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) moved, by leave, That the Paper be printed.

Mr. Calwell was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF URGENCY-STATEMENTS OF PRIME MINISTER ON SOUTH AFRICA.--Mr. Speaker informed the House that Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of urgent public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The arrogant and the provocative statements made by the Prime Minister after the Commonwealth Prime Ministers' Conference on the question of South Africa".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr. Calwell addressed the House.

We, the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament-

- 9. MARRIAGE BILL 1961.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the further consideration of the Bill.
