- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. NORTHERN TERRITORY—WITHHOLDING OF ASSENT TO ORDINANCES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—
 PRESENTATION OF PAPERS.—Mr. Hasluck (Minister for Territories), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the withholding of assent to the Licensing Ordinance 1961 and the Lottery and Gaming Ordinance 1961, which had been passed by the Legislative Council for the Northern Territory in March, 1961, and to subsequent actions and decisions by the Council and the Federal Cabinet. Mr. Hasluck then presented, pursuant to Statute, the following Papers:—

Northern Territory (Administration) Act—Statements of reasons for withholding assent to the Licensing Ordinance 1961 and the Lottery and Gaming Ordinance 1961.

Mr. Nelson, by leave, also made a Statement with reference to the matter.

3. PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute—

4. Australia and the Common Market—Ministerial Statement—Printing of Paper.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Menzies (Prime Minister), That the Paper [presented on the 16th August, 1961], viz.:—

Australia and the Common Market-Ministerial Statement-

be printed—And on the Amendment moved thereto by Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition), viz.:— That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:— "this House, while declaring that the United Kingdom's move to join the Common Market requires the strongest action to protect Australia's interests, expresses no confidence in this Government's ability to provide it because of its lack of forcsight and frankness in this matter, its dilatoriness now, and its continuing failure, as demonstrated by the Prime Minister's speech, to appreciate the real issues which are involved "—

Debate resumed.

Mr. Roberton (Minister for Social Services) moved, That Mr. Holt (Treasurer) be granted an extension of time.

Question-put and negatived.

Debate continued.

Question-That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question-put.

- 6. SUPPLY—BUDGET DEBATE.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

(In the Committee.)

General debate resumed on the question, That the first item in the Estimates, under Division No. 101.— Senate—namely—

Salaries and allowances £34,250

be agreed to.

Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment, That the first item be reduced by £1. Debate continued.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Lucock reported accordingly.

Ordered—That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.
