THURSDAY, 29TH MARCH, 1962.

1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honourable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were answered.

3. PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute—

Customs Tariff-Orders-Customs (Intermediate Tariff) Nos. 63, 64, 65.

Customs Tariff (Primage Duties)—Orders—Customs Tariff (Primage Duties) Nos. 71, 72, 73. Lands Acquisition Act—Land acquired for postal purposes—West Orange, New South Wales.

4. NORTHERN TERRITORY REPRESENTATION BILL 1962.—Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to remove the Disabilities imposed on the Member of the House of Representatives representing the Northern Territory.

Question—put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Calwell moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the debate was interrupted in accordance with Standing Order No. 108.

Ordered—That the time for the discussion of motions be extended until fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m. Debate continued.

The time allotted for precedence to General Business having expired, the debate was interrupted, Mr. Bate was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate was made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

5. EXCISE BILL 1962.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Fairhall (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. LOAN BILL 1962.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Mackinnon reported accordingly.

Suspension of Standing Orders-Extended Time for Speech.-Mr. Downer (Minister for Immigration) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) making his speech without limitation of time. Question-put and passed.

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Haworth), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
