- 6. CIVIL AVIATION (CARRIERS' LIABILITY) BILL 1962.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Townley (Minister representing the Minister for Civil Aviation) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

  - (a) tobacco that was returned to the factory in which it was manufactured and again subjected to processes of manufacture: or
  - (b) cigarettes or cigars that were returned to the factory in which they were manufactured and the tobacco in which was used in the manufacture of other cigarettes or cigars,

shall be deemed to have been lawfully made.".

Title-

On the motion of Mr. Fairhall, the Title was amended by adding the words ", and to Validate certain Refunds of Excise Duty".

Title, as amended, agreed to.
