1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PETITION.—Mr. Reynolds presented a Petition from certain electors in the State of New South Wales praying that the House will (1) make provision in the Budget for a substantial Federal emergency grant to all State Governments for education services and (2) set up a national committee of enquiry to investigate and report on the needs of primary, secondary and technical education throughout Australia.  
Petition received and read.
3. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were answered.

9. SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—EXTENDED TIME FOR SPEECH.—Mr. McMahon (Minister for Labour and National Service) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Mr. Whitlam making his speech on the Budget without limitation of time.  
Question—put and passed.
10. SUPPLY—BUDGET DEBATE.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

*(In the Committee.)*

General debate resumed on the question, That the first item in the Estimates, under Division No. 101.—

Senate—namely—

Salaries and allowances . . . . . £34,400

be agreed to.

Mr. Whitlam moved, as an amendment, That the first item be reduced by £1.

Debate continued.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Lucock reported accordingly.

Ordered—That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

11. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Swartz (Minister for Repatriation) moved, That the House do now adjourn.  
*Closure.*—Mr. Swartz moved, That the question be now put.
