EXTENSION OF TELEVISION SERVICES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT AND REPORT—MOTION FOR PRINTING PAPERS.—Mr. Davidson (Postmaster-General), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House of the developments which had occurred in the Government's plans for the extension of television services to country and provincial areas and announced that the Government had authorized the grant of licences for commercial television stations in five additional areas. Mr. Davidson then, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, laid upon the Table the following Papers:—
