WEDNESDAY, 22ND MAY, 1963.

1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PETITIONS.—Mr. Cross presented a Petition from certain electors of the Commonwealth praying that the Government (1) support the United Nations resolution for a Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, (2) ensure that foreign bases are not permitted on Australian soil and (3) in response to the call of the United Nations, declare Australia's willingness to enter into an agreement not to manufacture, test, station or acquire nuclear weapons.
Petition received and read.
Similar Petitions were presented by Mr. Kearney and Mr. O'Connor, and were severally received.
3. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were answered.
4. DEFENCE REVIEW—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION FOR PRINTING PAPER.—Sir Robert Menzies (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement reviewing the defence programme and informed the House of decisions made by the Government to further increase Australian defence preparedness. Sir Robert Menzies then, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, laid upon the Table the following Paper:—
Defence Review—Ministerial Statement, 22nd May, 1963—
and moved, That the Paper be printed.
Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
5. PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—
Foreign Affairs—Joint Committee—Report on the status of Berlin as it affects the relationship between the major powers, and Australia as an integral part of the western world.
New Guinea—Report to the General Assembly of the United Nations on Administration of New Guinea for year 1961-62.

Seat of Government (Administration) Act—Ordinance—1963—No. 9—Lay-by Sales Agreements.
6. POSTPONEMENT OF NOTICES OF MOTION.—Ordered—That Notices of Motion Nos. 1 and 2, Government Business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
7. UNITED STATES NAVAL COMMUNICATION STATION AGREEMENT BILL 1963.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the further consideration of the Bill.

Mr. Uren addressing the House and having been repeatedly called to order for irrelevance, the Speaker directed the honorable Member to discontinue his speech, and the honorable Member for Reid so requiring—

Question—That the Bill be now read a third time—put and passed.—Bill read a third time.

14. SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.—Mr. Holt (Treasurer) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Order of the Day No. 5, Government Business, being called on.

Question—put and passed.

15. LOAN (QANTAS EMPIRE AIRWAYS LIMITED) BILL 1963.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the Question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
