Petition received and read.

And so it was negatived.

Clause 22 debated and agreed to.

Remainder of Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Lucock reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Swartz (Minister representing the Minister for Health), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

20. ADJOURNMENT.-Mr. Swartz (Minister for Repatriation) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
