PETITION.—Mr. Kelly presented a petition from certain woolgrowers in Australia praying that (1) the Australian Wool Board be restrained from expending large portions of its funds in putting the case for a reserve price scheme for wool and (2) the Parliament do not pass any legislation designed to enable a referendum of growers to be held on the adoption of a reserve price marketing scheme until an independent and impartial committee of inquiry has investigated and reported upon the proposal.
Petition received.
3. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were asked.
4. PAPER.—The following paper was presented, pursuant to statute—
Broadcasting and Television Act—Australian Broadcasting Commission—Thirty-third Annual Report and financial statement, for year 1964-65.
