## THURSDAY, 24TH MARCH, 1966.

- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Petition.—Mr. Wentworth presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that ac ion be taken, through Constitution alteration referendum proposals, to give the Commonwealth power to make laws for the advancement of the Aboriginal people and prevent the making of laws which would discriminate against any person born or naturalized in Australia. Petition received and read.
- 3. Questions without notice were asked.
- 4. Public Accounts Committee—Reports—Statement by Member.—Mr. Cleaver (Chairman) brought up the following reports from the Joint Committee of Public Accounts:-

- 5. RIVER SYSTEMS CONTROL AUTHORITY.—Mr. Allan moved, pursuant to notice, That the Commonwealth should establish a planning and constructing authority in association with the States to regulate the flow of all major river systems in Australia including the Darling River and its tributaries in Queensland ard New South Wales.
  - Mr. Patterson moved, as an amendment, That the following words be added to the motion:—" and should incorporate the Snowy Mountains Hydro-electric Authority's investigation, design and construction teams in the proposed authority".

And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) viz.:—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—"this House records—

- (1) its most emphatic opposition to the despatch of conscripted youths for service in Vietnam and the increased military commitment in that country, and
- (2) its disapproval of and grave concern at the Government's failure—
  - (a) to maintain the purchasing power of the Australian community;
  - (b) to retain an adequate and proper Australian share in the ownership and development of our national resources, particularly in Northern Australia;
  - (c) to alleviate the effects of the drought and take steps to rehabilitate rural industries and conserve water resources;
  - (d) to make adequate provision for housing and associated community facilities, and
  - (e) to submit to referendum the two Bills to alter the Constitution in respect of Aborigines and the Parliament which were passed last year and, in connexion with the latter Bill, to disclose the related distribution proposals "—
