- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Si: John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Questions without notice were asked.
- 3. Paper.—The following paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—Northern Territory—Report for year 1964-65.
- 4. POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY.—Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 to 4, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 5. Sulfhate of Ammonia Bounty Bill 1966.—The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 165, dated 21nd March, 1966, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr. Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), the Bill was read a third time.

6. JUDICIARY BILL 1966.—The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr. Whitlam who moved, as an amendment, That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—"this House is of the opinion that no ordinance should deny the right to practise as a barrister in a Territory to a person who has been admitted so to practise in any State".

Detate continued.

Amendment amended by Mr. Whitlam, by leave, by omitting "practise" (first occurring) from the words proposed to be inserted and inserting "admission" in place thereof.

Det ate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question-That the Bill be now read a second time-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr. Snedden (Attorney-General), the Bill was read a third time.

7. Australian Capital Territory Supreme Court Bill 1966.—The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr. Snedden (Attorney-General), the Bill was read a third time.

8. Loan (Housing) Bill 1966.—The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr. Whitlam who moved, as an amendment, That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—"whilst not in any way opposing the passage of this Bill, the House is of opinion that the existing Housing Agreement has not fully met the housing requirements of the Australian people and that before a new Agreement (to which part of the money to be provided by this Bill may be applied) is entered into, an all-Party Committee should be appointed to investigate all its aspects with particular regard to (1) rental rebates, (2) slum clearance, (3) housing for pensioners, (4) land development, and (5) town planning".

Debate adjourned (Mr. L. H. Irwin), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.
