- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 3 Message from the Governor-General—Assent to Bill: A Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced informing the House that His Excellency, in the name of Her Majesty, had assented to the following Bill: 27 February 1967—Message No. 2—Ministers of State 1967.
- 4 LOAN (WAR SERVICE LAND SETTLEMENT) BILL 1967: Mr Adermann (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to authorize the Raising and Expending of a sum not exceeding Six million seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars for a Defence Purpose, namely, Financial Assistance to the States of South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania in connexion with War Service Land Settlement.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Adermann moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Beaton), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE—REFERENCE OF WORK—EXCHANGE BUILDING, PITT STREET, SYDNEY: Mr Kelly (Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913–1966, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report: Erection of a new Exchange Building in Pitt Street, Sydney

Mr Kelly presented plans in connection with the proposed work. Question—put and passed.

6 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament—

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr Beaton), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

7 Customs Tariff Bill 1967: Mr Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise) presented a Bill for an Act relating to Duties of Customs.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Howson moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 Constitution Alteration (Parliament) Bill 1967: Mr Holt (Prime Minister), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution so that the Number of Members of the House of Representatives may be increased without necessarily increasing the Number of Senators.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Holt moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Whitlam—Leader of the Opposition), and, by leave, the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

9 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (ABORIGINALS) BILL 1967: Mr Holt (Prime Minister), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution so as to omit certain words relating to the People of the Aboriginal Race in any State and so that Aboriginals are to be counted in reckoning the Population.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Holt moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Whitlam—Leader of the Opposition), and, by leave, the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

10 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (PARLIAMENT) BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

Mr Holt (Prime Minister) moved—That the Bill be now read a third time.

Question-put.

No division being called for and there being no dissentient voice, Mr Speaker drew attention to the constitutional requirement that the Bill must be passed by an absolute majority and directed the bells to be rung.

The bells having ceased ringing, Mr Speaker again put the question and declared it in favour of the "Ayes". No division being called for and there being no dissentient voice Mr Speaker directed that the names of those Members present agreeing to the third reading be recorded, and appointed tellers.
