- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.

3 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—POSTAL SECTION OF THE POSTMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Webb had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The Government's failure to maintain the efficiency of the postal section of the Postmaster-General's Department and its failure to maintain harmonious industrial relations with the unions in the introduction of automotive processes". The proposed discussion having received the necessary support— Mr Webb addressed the House. Discussion ensued. Discussion concluded.

MR SPEAKER,

Thank you for your Address in Reply which you have just presented to me.

It will be my pleasure and my duty to convey to Her Most Gracious Majesty The Queen at once the Message of Loyalty from the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, to which the Address gives expression.
