# WEDNESDAY, 14 AUGUST 1968

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Jess presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of La Trobe praying that the Government convey as urgently as possible its belief to our American allies that all aspects of the war in Vietnam should be intensified, while pursuing a policy of no compromise at the current Paris talks.

Petition received.

Mr McLeay presented a petition from certain electors of the Commonwealth praying that this House take any action necessary to ensure that the Government does not implement the Resolution of the United Nations Security Council imposing economic sanctions upon the Government and people of Rhodesia.

Petition received.

Mr Hansen presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House wil! make a survey of the full requirements of pensioners of all types and adopt a policy for the progressive liberalisation of the means test resulting in its removal within three years.

Petition received and read.

Similar petitions were presented by Mr Corbett and Mr Drury, and were severally received.

Petitions from certain electors of the Commonwealth praying that the Government implement Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights by providing increased social service and housing benefits for the aged, the invalid, the widowed and their dependants were presented by Mr King, Mr Everingham, Mr Courtnay, Mr Lee, Mr G. D. Erwin and Mr Peacock.

Petitions severally received.

Mr James presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House take any action necessary to assist a campaign for a lasting peaceful settlement in Vietnam.

Petition received and read.

A similar petition was presented by Mr D. M. Cameron, and was received.

- 5 EXPLANATORY MEMORANDA RELATING TO BILLS—DISTRIBUTION—STATEMENT BY MR SPEAKER: Mr Speaker informed the House that, in order to provide a wider distribution of all explanatory memoranda circulated upon the introduction of related Bills, he had now arranged for these memoranda to be published by the Government Printer and be available for sale and to be distributed to all those institutions and persons who receive copies of Bills.
- 6 ADVANCE TO THE TREASURER 1967-68—STATEMENT OF EXPENDITURE: Mr McMahon (Treasurer), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Advance to the Treasurer for year 1967-68—Statement of heads of expenditure and the amounts charged thereto pursuant to section 36A of the *Audit Act* 1901-1966.

8 EDUCATION—NEW MEASURES ANNOUNCED IN BUDGET—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to the new measures in education which were announced in the Budget Speech, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

9 MINISTER FOR REPATRIATION—MOTION OF LACK OF CONFIDENCE: Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) moved, by leave—That the House expresses lack of confidence in the Minister for Repatriation because he (a) has lost the confidence of ex-servicemen's organisations and ex-servicemen, (b) has failed to administer the Repatriation Act with compassion and flexibility, and (c) has failed to bring pensions and benefits to acceptable levels.

Debate ensued.

Mr Gorton (Prime Minister) presented the following paper:

Letters dated 20 and 23 September 1966 exchanged between Mr W. K. Mooney, Chairman, No. 6 War Pensions Assessment Appeal Tribunal, and Senator the Honourable G. C. McKellar, Minister for Repatriation.
