- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Scholes presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the House press for a speedy ending of the war in Vietnam by the implementation of the proposals of the United Nations Secretary-General, U Thant. Mr Everingham presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying

that this House take any action necessary to assist a campaign for a lasting peaceful settlement in Vietnam.

Petitions severally received and read.

3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice being asked-

Mr Snedden (Minister for Immigration) answering a question asked by Mr McLeay— *Point of order:* Mr Uren raised a point of order that the question was out of order. *Speaker's ruling:* Mr Speaker ruled that the question was in order.

4 BRITISH SHIPPING ENTERING PORT OF HAIPHONG, NORTH VIETNAM: Mr Killen moved, pursuant to notice—That this House expresses its profound regret that Her Majesty's British Government is still permitting ships sailing under the British flag to enter the Port of Haiphong in North Vietnam when that port is the major port of entry for military supplies to North Vietnam and to the Viet Cong, and calls upon Her Majesty's Australian Government to draw to the attention of Her Majesty's British Government the fact that troops owing allegiance to Her Majesty are fighting in South Vietnam, and further, that it is the view of this House that while hostilities continue, Her Majesty's British Government should direct that no ship flying the British flag should enter the Port of Haiphong.

Debate ensued.

- It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 109.
- Ordered-That the time for the discussion of notices be extended until fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m.

Debate continued.

- The time allotted for precedence to general business having expired, the debate was interrupted, Mr Hasluck (Minister for External Affairs) was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate was made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 5 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE-CUSTOMS BILL (No. 2) 1968: Mr Speaker reported message No. 77, dated 16 October 1968, from the Senate transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act relating to the Customs". Bill read a first time.

Ordered-That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—BEER EXCISE ACT REPEAL BILL 1968: Mr Speaker reported message No. 80, dated 16 October 1968, from the Senate transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to repeal the 'Beer Excise Act 1901-1968', and for purposes related thereto". Bill read a first time.

Ordered-That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—CANNED FRUIT EXCISE ACT REPEAL BILL 1968: Mr Speaker reported message No. 81, dated 16 October 1968, from the Senate transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to repeal the 'Canned Fruit Excise Act 1963-1968', and for purposes related thereto".

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE-SALES TAX ASSESSMENT BILL (NO. 5) 1968: Mr Speaker reported message No. 82, dated 16 October 1968, from the Senate transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to give effect, in relation to Sales Tax, to the European Convention on Customs Treatment of Pallets used in International Transport".

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT BILL (No. 4) 1968: Mr Freeth (Minister assisting the Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Law relating to Income Tax. Bill read a first time.

Mr Freeth moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE—REFERENCE OF WORK—SOUND BROADCASTING STUDIOS FOR AUSTRALIAN BROADCASTING COMMISSION, COLLINSWOOD, S.A.: Mr Kelly (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913–1966, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report: Construction of sound broadcasting studios for the Australian Broadcasting Commission at Collinswood, S.A.

Mr Kelly presented plans in connection with the proposed work.

Ouestion-put and passed.

21 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Barnes (Minister for External Territories) moved—That the House do now adjourn.
