## WEDNESDAY, 23 APRIL 1969

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Bendigo Electoral Division—Issue of writ: Mr Speaker informed the House that it was his intention to issue a writ, on Wednesday, 30 April, for the election of a Member to serve for the Electoral Division of Bendigo, in the State of Victoria, in the place of Mr Noel Lawrence Beaton, resigned. The dates in connection with the election would be fixed as follows:

Date of nomination ... Friday, 16 May 1969.

Date of polling ... Saturday, 7 June 1969.

Date of return of writ ... ... On or before Friday, 4 July 1969.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING: Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House) moved— That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Tuesday next at half-past two o'clock p.m. Question—put and passed.
- 5 DECIMAL CURRENCY BOARD (ABOLITION) BILL 1969: Mr Swartz (Minister assisting the Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to abolish the Decimal Currency Board and for purposes connected therewith.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 Public Works Committee—Reference of Work—Augmentation of Darwin water supply: Mr Kelly (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913–1966, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report: Augmentation of water supply to Darwin.

Mr Kelly presented a plan in connection with the proposed work.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

7 Overseas Shipping—Australian Entry—Ministerial statement—Motion to take Note of paper: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House)—That the House take note of the paper (presented on 22 April 1969), viz.:

Overseas Shipping—Australian Entry—Ministerial statement, 22 April 1969—

Debate resumed.

Point of order: A point of order having been raised by Mr C. K. Jones that the remark of Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services) that the Australian Labor Party was in alliance with the Communist Party on the Vietnam affair was offensive to him and should be withdrawn—

Deputy Speaker's ruling: The Deputy Speaker (Mr Lucock) ruled that the remark was a general one and could not be regarded as offensive to a particular individual in the House

Dissent from ruling: Mr Jones moved—That the ruling be dissented from.

Debate ensued on the motion of dissent.

Question—That the ruling be dissented from—put. The House divided (the Deputy Speaker, Mr Lucock, in the Chair)—
