- 6 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1969-70—BUDGET DEBATE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "this House is of opinion that the Budget is inadequate in that—
  - (a) it increases taxation and health and housing costs for families,
  - (b) it makes no considered and comprehensive approach to the needs of all schools.
  - (c) it ignores the problems of capital cities and regional centres,
  - (d) it defers further development projects and urgent rural measures, and
  - (e) it neglects industries based on Australian natural resources and defence requirements"—

Debate resumed.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.
