- 9 Social Services Bill 1969: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Daly, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "whilst not opposing the provisions of the Bill, the House condemns the Government because it has failed to—
 - (a) increase adequately rates of all pensions and social service benefits to meet the increased cost of living;
 - (b) investigate and deal with the real areas of need and poverty;
 - (c) provide an equitable and just basis for regular review of social service benefits to maintain their purchasing power;
 - (d) eliminate injustices of discrimination between pensioners and the sick and the needy;
 - (e) provide 'fringe benefits' for all pensioners;
 - (f) give effect to the 1949 election policy of the Liberal-Country Party to abolish the means test; and
 - (g) make benefits retrospective to 1 July 1969"—
