- 12 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH: Mr Brown brought up the Address in Reply to His Excellency's Speech, prepared by the committee appointed on 3 March, and the same was read by the Clerk, as follows:
  - MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament.

Mr Brown moved—That the Address be agreed to.

Mr O'Keefe seconded the motion.

Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for speech: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) speaking without limitation of time.

Question-put and passed.

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Whitlam), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

- 13 POSTPONEMENT OF NOTICES: Ordered—That notices Nos. 1 to 3, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 14 HOMES SAVINGS GRANT BILL 1970: Mr Killen (Minister for the Navy), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Homes Savings Grant Act* 1964–1967. Bill read a first time.

Mr Killen moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Uren), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

15 LOAN (WAR SERVICE LAND SETTLEMENT) BILL 1970: Mr Anthony (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to authorise the Raising and Expending of a sum not exceeding Four million five hundred thousand dollars for a Defence Purpose, namely, Financial Assistance to the States of South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania in connexion with War Service Land Settlement. Bill read a first time.

Mr Anthony moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

16 MAPPING SURVEYS BILL 1970: Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Surveys required for the Preparation of Maps for Commonwealth purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

- Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 17 AUSTRALIAN FILM DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION BILL 1970: Mr Gorton (Prime Minister), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to establish a Corporation for the purpose of encouraging the Making of Australian Cinematograph and Television Films and encouraging the Distribution of such Films within and outside Australia. Bill read a first time.

Mr Gorton moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hayden), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

18 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to: MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

Fraser (Minister for Defence), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of new circumstances that had arisen concerning the F-111 aircraft project and of the decision of the Government that he should visit the United States to discuss the matter with the United States Secretary of Defence.
  - Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 20 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.
