HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

No. 64

THURSDAY, 15 OCTOBER 1970

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr J. F. Cairns presented a petition from certain citizens of Victoria praying that this House take immediate steps to increase the base pension rate to 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings.
 - Mr Garrick presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will seek the co-operation of the States and supply extra finance to the States to enable (1) proper town planning and development to halt the increase in densely populated areas which lead to increased crime, (2) the proper staffing and equipping of police forces to enable adequate crime prevention and detection measures to reduce the frightening increase of both solved and unsolved crime, (3) the proper detention of and rehabilitation of criminals and (4) compensation to victims of crimes of violence.

Petitions severally received and read.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Garrick was presented by Mr Kirwan, and was received.
- Mr J. F. Cairns presented a petition from certain electors of the Divisions of Kooyong and Chisholm praying that all Australian troops be immediately withdrawn from Vietnam.
- Mr Kirwan presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) the allowance of personal education expenses as a taxation deduction, (2) the removal of the present age limit in respect of the deduction for education expenses, (3) an increase in the deduction allowable for tertiary education expenses, (4) an increase in the maintenance allowance for students and (5) the exemption of non-bonded scholarships for part-time students from income tax.
- Mr Fox presented a petition from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the export of all kangaroo products be banned immediately.

Petitions severally received and read.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 PAPER: The following paper was presented, pursuant to statute:

Atomic Energy Act—Australian Atomic Energy Commission—Eighteenth Annual Report and financial statements, together with the Auditor-General's Report, for year 1969-70.

5 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—MEAT EXPORTS TO THE UNITED STATES:

Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Patterson had proposed that a definite
matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely,
"The failure of the Federal Government to take positive action to halt the seriously
deteriorating condition of Australia's export meat trade with the United States".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support-

Mr Patterson addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Mr Grassby rising to address the House-

Mr Nixon (Acting Minister for Primary Industry) moved—That the business of the day be called on.

Question-put and passed.

6 CANBERRA COLLEGE OF ADVANCED EDUCATION BILL 1970: Mr N. H. Bowen (Minister for Education and Science), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Canberra College of Advanced Education Act 1967.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bowen moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Beazley), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 FISHERIES BILL 1970: Mr Nixon (Acting Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Fisheries Act* 1952–1968 in relation to the operation of certain State and Territory laws and to omit references to Nauru. Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Stewart), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 PHOSPHATE FERTILIZERS BOUNTY BILL 1970: Mr Chipp (Minister for Customs and Excise), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the payment of Bounty on the Production of certain Phosphate Fertilizers.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Chipp moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 STATES GRANTS (ABORIGINAL ADVANCEMENT) BILL 1970: Mr Wentworth (Minister in charge of Aboriginal Affairs), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States in connexion with the Welfare and Advancement (including Housing) of the Aboriginal People of Australia.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Wentworth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 10 Postponement of notices: Ordered—That notices Nos. 5 and 6, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 11 NAVIGATION BILL (No. 2) 1970: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Shipping and Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make Provision for and in relation to Preventing, and Dealing with the Effects of, Pollution by Oil of the Australian Coast, Australian Coastal Waters and Australian Reefs.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 LIGHTHOUSES BILL 1970: The order of the day having been read for the second reading— Mr Sinclair (Minister for Shipping and Transport) moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 Message from the Governor-General—Assent to Bills: A message from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced informing the House that His Excellency, in the name of Her Majesty, had assented to the following Bills:

14 SHELTERED EMPLOYMENT (ASSISTANCE) BILL 1970: The House, according to order, resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the further consideration of the Bill.

In the committee

Bill, as a whole, debated and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Lucock reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

15 STATES GRANTS (MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTIONS) BILL 1970: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Hayden who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "whilst not opposing the provisions of the Bill, this House is of opinion that provision should be made by the Commonwealth for adequate financial assistance to allow the development of community and integrated mental health services on a regional basis". Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

18 DEFENCE FORCES RETIREMENT BENEFITS BILL (No. 2) 1970: Mr Bury (Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Retirement Benefits for Members of the Defence Force.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bury moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

19 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1970-71: The House, according to order, resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the further consideration of the Bill.
