WEDNESDAY, 28 APRIL 1971

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Cass presented a petition from certain residents of the Australian Capital Territory praying that a Committee of Inquiry, on which are represented the Department of Education and Science, institutions of tertiary education, practising educators, and the Canberra community, be instituted to inquire into the form that an Australian Capital Territory Education Authority should take, the educational principles and philosophy that should underly it, and its mode of operation and administration.

Petition received and read.

- Mr Graham presented a petition from certain citizens of North Sydney praying that the House seek to ensure that Commonwealth legislation bearing on films, literature and radio and television programmes is so framed and so administered as to give the maximum freedom to adults to choose what they will watch, read and listen to, even in the face of pressure from those who seek to impose their ideas and morals on others who do not share them.
- Mr L. H. Irwin presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the export of products made from kangaroos be banned and the Commonwealth Government take necessary steps to have all wildlife in Australia brought under its control. Petitions severally received.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 PAPER: The following paper was presented, pursuant to statute:
 - Marginal Dairy Farms Agreements Act—Copy of Agreement made on 2 April 1971 between the Commonwealth of Australia and the State of South Australia in relation to the Marginal Dairy Farms Reconstruction Scheme.
- 5 H.M.A.S. Leeuwin—Incidents involving recruits—Judicial inquiry—Ministerial statement: Mr Mackay (Minister for the Navy), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House that he had requested His Honour Judge Rapke to conduct an inquiry into incidents involving the alleged maltreatment of recruits by other recruits at H.M.A.S. Leeuwin.
 - Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
 - Mr Kirwan asked leave to make a statement on the same subject.
 - Objection being raised, leave not granted.

6 Tariff Policy—Ministerial statement—Motion to take note of paper: Mr Anthony (Minister for Trade and Industry), by leave, made a ministerial statement on tariff policy, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Kelly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 WOOL INDUSTRY BILL 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to empower the Commonwealth to Guarantee the Repayment of Loans to the Australian Wool Board in connexion with Wool-selling Centres.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT BILL (No. 2) 1971: Mr Snedden (Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Law relating to Income Tax in respect of Interest paid by Companies on Bearer Debentures and in respect of Interest paid to Non-residents. Bill read a first time.

Mr Snedden moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 INCOME TAX (WITHHOLDING TAX RECOUPMENT) BILL 1971: Mr Snedden (Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to impose Income Tax upon certain Interest that has been exempted from Withholding Tax.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Snedden moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 INCOME TAX (BEARER DEBENTURES) BILL 1971: Mr Snedden (Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to impose Income Tax upon Interest paid or credited by Companies in respect of certain Debentures.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Snedden moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 International Tin Agreement Bill 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hunt (Minister for the Interior), the Bill was read a third time.

15 CUSTOMS TARIFF BILL 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connor), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

16 TAXATION—STATUTORY DEFINITION OF A PUBLIC COMPANY—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—
MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Snedden (Treasurer), by leave, made a ministerial
statement with reference to the implications of the recent decision of the High Court
in the income tax case of Commissioner of Taxation v. Casuarina Pty Ltd which had
disclosed a gap in the income tax legislation providing a statutory definition of a
public company, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented
the following paper:

Taxation—Statutory definition of a public company—Ministerial statement, 28 April 1971.

Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Giles), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

17 Customs Tariff Bill 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Mr Grassby rising to address the House-

Closure: Mr Giles moved—That the question be now put.

Question—That the question be now put—put and passed.

And the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—was put accordingly, and passed—Bill read a second time.
