TUESDAY, 12 OCTOBER 1971

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (MR J. W. HADLEY): Mr Speaker informed the House of the death, on 16 July, of Mr James William Hadley, a Member of this House for the Division of Lilley from 1943 to 1949.
 - As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased all Members present stood, in silence.
- 3 Petitions: Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House raise to \$10 million Australian aid to refugees now in India from East Pakistan and give support to all efforts to guarantee the fully autonomous development of the people of Bangla Desh. Petition received and read.
 - Similar petitions were presented by Mr C. R. Cameron and Mr Beazley, and were severally received.
 - Mr Reid presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government grant income tax deduction for donations over \$2 made towards the relief of overseas disaster areas and that this be effected with haste to ensure the maximum possible aid to those at present in refugee camps and those in danger of famine in East Pakistan.
 - Mr Hurford presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government go beyond the plea of the Prime Minister for magnanimity and compassion in the trial of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman on charges of treason and insist on the liberty of this openly and democratically elected leader.
 - Mr Fox and Mr McIvor each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take steps to offer employment, at least on a temporary basis, in order to effect some relief, to academic and qualified persons among the refugees from Bangla Desh.
 - Mr Gorton, Mr L. K. Johnson, Mr Jarman, Mr Hamer and Mr Garrick each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House (a) increase monetary aid for the East Pakistani refugees to at least \$5 million immediately, (b) encourage and sponsor teams of volunteers with needed skills and medical supplies and (c) maintain this aid for the period of the crisis.
 - Mr James and Mr MacKellar each presented a petition from certain electors of Australia praying that the Government revise its interpretation of the Geneva Protocol of 1925 relating to chemical agents of warfare, and declare that it regards all chemical substances employed for their toxic effects on man, animals or plants, as being included in the prohibitions laid down by that Protocol.
 - Mr Fox also presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that (1) the management of Australia's wildlife be controlled by the Commonwealth Government and sufficient wardens be appointed to enforce the laws, (2) the shooting of kangaroos for commercial purposes be stopped immediately, (3) the export of all kangaroo products from Australia be banned and (4) the Commonwealth Government also establish large national parks of good quality land as major tourist attractions.

Mr MacKellar also presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will (a) ban the shooting of kangaroos for commercial purposes, (b) ban the export of all kangaroo products from Australia, (c) prevent the extinction of the red kangaroo, (d) institute a scientific survey of the kangaroo population, (e) establish large national parks of good quality land as major tourist attractions and (f) take control of and be completely responsible for the management of Australia's wildlife.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Bennett presented a petition from certain citizens of Western Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to increase the base pension rate to 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings.

Petition received and read.

Mr Webb and Mr Bennett each presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the sales tax and customs duties on all forms of contraceptive devices be removed, and that all contraceptive devices be placed on the National Health Scheme Pharmaceutical Benefits list.

Petitions severally received.

Mr L. R. Johnson presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

Petition received and read.

A similar petition to that presented by Mr L. R. Johnson was presented by Mr Morrison and was received.

Mr Dobie presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House should cause the Australian Government to recognise the right of Australian professional people engaged in the creative and performing arts to develop further their skills and talents in Australia, and to be protected from overseas programmes in a way that will encourage an Australian television and radio industry.

Petition received.

- 4 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 5 STATEMENT BY MEMBER—LEAVE TO MAKE NOT GRANTED: Mr C. R. Cameron asked leave to make a statement.

Objection being raised, leave not granted.

6 Suspension of standing orders moved: Mr C. R. Cameron moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the honourable Member for Hindmarsh (Mr C. R. Cameron) making a statement.

Debate ensued.

13 NATIONAL HEALTH BILL 1971 [No. 2]: Mr Swartz (Minister representing the Minister for Health), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Provision of Nursing Home and Pharmaceutical Benefits and Medical Services.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved —That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hayden), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 DEVELOPMENT OF R.A.A.F. BASE, LAVERTON, VIC.—APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr Chipp (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1969, it is expedient

to carry out the following proposed work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the committee has duly reported to Parliament: Development of R.A.A.F. Base, Laverton, Vic.

Question—put and passed.

15 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1971-72: The House, according to order, resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the further consideration of the Bill.
