THURSDAY, 2 DECEMBER 1971

- 1 The House met, at ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Beazley presented a petition from certain electors of Australia praying that the Government revise its interpretation of the Geneva Protocol of 1925 relating to chemical agents of warfare, and declare that it regards all chemical substances employed for their toxic effects on man, animals or plants, as being included in the prohibitions laid down by that Protocol.
 - Mr Daly presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House seek to have Australia adopt the principle followed by Britain, Italy, Greece, Malta, The Netherlands, France, Germany, Turkey, Canada and the United States of America, which already transfer the social entitlement of their citizens wherever they may choose to live.
 - Mr C. R. Cameron, Mr Gun, Mr D. M. Cameron and Mr Hurford each presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Federal Government take immediate steps to act on behalf of all Australian people to preserve Lake Pedder in its natural state.
 - Mr Bennett presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the sales tax and customs duties on all forms of contraceptive devices be removed, and that all contraceptive devices be placed on the National Health Scheme Pharmaceutical Benefits list.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Kennedy presented a petition from certain citizens of the community of the University of Western Australia praying that the Government take immediate action to introduce in order of priority (1) universal Commonwealth scholarships, (2) Commonwealth scholarships on the basis of need rather than academic ability and (3) the abolition of tertiary fees.

Petition received and read.

- Similar petitions to that presented by Mr Kennedy were presented by Mr Scholes, Mr Berinson and Mr Everingham, and were severally received.
- Mr Bennett, Mr Kirwan and Mr Webb each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House give earnest consideration to the crisis in Aboriginal welfare which exists in the South West Land Division of Western Australia.
- Mr Lloyd presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Government (1) immediately increase Australia's contribution to the refugee appeal by \$10 million and (2) press for a just solution to the conflict, so that the refugees may return to their homes.
- Mr Reid and Mr McLeay each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will provide \$10 million for relief purposes in India and East Pakistan, and a further \$50 million over 3 years to help rehabilitate the refugees in East Pakistan.

- Mr Bury presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.
- Mr Reynolds presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that (1) the National Service Act be repealed and (2) amnesty be granted to all those charged, or liable to be charged, under the Act.
- Mr Wallis presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House should (1) increase monetary aid for refugees in India to at least \$1 per capita immediately and make provision for a further and extra grant for the victims of the famine in East Pakistan, (2) grant tax deductibility to donations of \$2 and over to Australian voluntary agencies working with the refugee problem and (3) ensure that the Australian Government does all in its power to help bring about a political settlement which would be acceptable to the people of East Pakistan.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Kennedy also presented a petition from the Bendigo Citizens for Pakistani Refugee Relief Appeal praying that the Government will (1) increase its aid to the Pakistani refugees to \$10 million, (2) grant income tax deductibility for donations to overseas aid organisations and (3) endeavour by diplomatic initiatives to seek a just and humane solution to the problem of the refugees.

Petition received and read.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 Papers: The following paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General:

Tariff Board—Report—Toluene and xylene (Dumping and Subsidies Act).

The following papers were presented, pursuant to statute:

Conciliation and Arbitration Act—President of the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Commission—Fifteenth Annual Report, for year ended 13 August 1971.

Metric Conversion Act—Metric Conversion Board—First Annual Report, for year 1970-71, together with report by Minister on the operation of the Act.

Sugar Agreement Act—Fruit Industry Sugar Concession Committee—Fortieth Annual Report, and Statement of Receipts and Expenditure certified by the Auditor-General of the Commonwealth, for year 1970–71.

5 GRIEVANCE DEBATE: Pursuant to the provisions of standing order 106, the order of the day having been read—

Question proposed—That grievances be noted.

Debate ensued.

It being fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 106.

Question—That grievances be noted—put and passed.

6 DISCHARGE OF ORDER OF THE DAY: The following order of the day, government business, viz.: Salaries Bill (No. 2) 1971: Second reading—Resumption of debate—having been read—

Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the order of the day be discharged. Question—put and passed.

7 SALARIES (STATUTORY OFFICES) ADJUSTMENT BILL 1971: Mr Swartz (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Remuneration and Allowances payable to the Holders of certain Statutory Offices.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 181, dated 1 December 1971, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Swartz, the Bill was read a third time.

8 JUDICIAL APPOINTMENT (FIJI) BILL 1971: Mr N. H. Bowen (Minister for Foreign Affairs), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Acceptance and Holding of the Office of Chief Justice of Fiji by a Judge of the Commonwealth Industrial Court. Bill read a first time.

Mr Bowen moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Bowen, the Bill was read a third time.

9 Unemployment Relief in non-metropolitan areas—Ministerial statement—Motion to take note of paper: Mr McMahon (Prime Minister), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to a Commonwealth offer of financial assistance to the States for the relief of non-metropolitan unemployment, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Unemployment relief in non-metropolitan areas—Ministerial statement, 2 December 1971.

Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Giles), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 STATES GRANTS BILL (No. 2) 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 182, dated 10 November 1971, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

11 STATES GRANTS (CAPITAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 183, dated 30 September 1971, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue and moneys for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

12 STATES GRANTS (SPECIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 184, dated 12 October 1971, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

13 STATES GRANTS (ABORIGINAL ADVANCEMENT) BILL 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Beazley who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "the House, while not refusing a second reading to the Bill, regrets the failure of the Government to assume the responsibilities accorded to it by the Referendum of May 1967, and in particular deplores the evasion of full Commonwealth responsibility for Aboriginal housing, Aboriginal employment and training for employment, for Aboriginal education at all levels, for the reduction of Aboriginal neo-natal, infant and child mortality, and for Aboriginal health generally, especially for the elimination of leprosy and tuberculosis from the Aboriginal people".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put. The House divided (the Deputy Speaker, Mr Lucock, in the Chair)—

"(c) nine other Ministers of the House of Assembly appointed by the Ministers of the House of Assembly, but such appointments shall not become effective unless and until the House of Assembly has, by resolution, approved the appointments; and".
