TUESDAY, 9 MAY 1972

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.
- 2 ABSENCE OF MR SPEAKER: The Clerk having informed the House that Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) was unavoidably absent, the Chairman of Committees (Mr Lucock) took the Chair as Acting Speaker, and read Prayers.
- 3 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following honourable Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Forbes (Minister for Immigration), Mr Peacock (Minister for External Territories), Mr A. D. Fraser, Mr Giles, Mr Jess and Mr Luchetti—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House will take immediate steps to call a halt to the closing of post offices and the reorganisation of the Post Office and initiate a joint parliamentary inquiry into the Postmaster-General's Department.
 - Mr Calwell, Mr G. D. Erwin, Mr Hamer, Mr Jess, Mr L. R. Johnson, Mr McIvor, Mr Reynolds and Mr Whittorn—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will immediately enact legislation providing for a base pension rate of 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings and other health and social service changes and initiate a public inquiry into Australia's social welfare structure.
 - Mr Armitage and Mr Klugman—from certain residents of the western suburbs in the Sydney metropolitan area and surrounding districts praying that this House take appropriate steps to ensure that the Government does not proceed with the proposal to site the second twenty-four hour international airport for Sydney at Richmond or anywhere else in the far western suburbs of the metropolitan area.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

 relating to recent events leading to the formation of a Ministry and ministerial membership of the Administrator's Executive Council in Papua New Guinea.

- 9 Income Tax Assessment Act—Division 10AAA.—Proposed amendment—Ministerial statement: Mr Garland (Minister assisting the Treasurer), by leave, made a ministerial statement relating to the proposed amendment of provisions of the income tax law which authorise the allowance of tax deductions for capital expenditure on facilities used for the transport of minerals.
 - Mr Stewart, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 10 ALTERATION OF HOURS OF MEETING: Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved, pursuant to notice—That for the remainder of this period of sittings, unless otherwise ordered, the House shall meet for the despatch of business on each Tuesday and Wednesday at two o'clock p.m. and on each Thursday at ten o'clock a.m.
