 - Dr Forbes—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the basic principles of the existing national health scheme.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Hayden moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Chipp), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

17 COMMONWEALTH ELECTORAL BILL (No. 2) 1973 [No. 2]: Mr Daly (Minister for Services and Property), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Distribution of the States into Electoral Divisions.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Daly moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

18 AIR NAVIGATION BILL 1973: Mr Jones (Minister for Civil Aviation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Air Navigation Act 1920-1971.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Jones moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

19 ABORIGINAL AFFAIRS (ARRANGEMENTS WITH THE STATES) BILL 1973: Mr Bryant (Minister for Aboriginal Affairs), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act providing for Arrangements with the States with respect to Aboriginal Affairs.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bryant moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

20 IMMIGRATION (EDUCATION) BILL 1973: Mr Grassby (Minister for Immigration), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Immigration (Education) Act* 1971. Bill read a first time.

Mr Grassby moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

21 ALIENS BILL 1973: Mr Grassby (Minister for Immigration), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Aliens Act* 1947-1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Grassby moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 22 DAYS AND HOURS OF SITTING—ADJOURNMENT OF SITTING: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved, pursuant to notice—

- 25 PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE SYSTEM—PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved, pursuant to notice—
 - (1) That a Joint Committee be appointed to inquire into, report on and make recommendations for—
 - (a) a balanced system of committees for the Parliament;
 - (b) the integration of the committee system into the procedures of the Parliament; and
 - (c) arrangements for committee meetings which will best suit the convenience of Senators and Members.
 - (2) That the committee consist of three Members of the House of Representatives nominated by the Prime Minister, one Member of the House of Representatives nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the House of Representatives, one Member of the House of Representatives nominated by the Leader of the Australian Country Party in the House of Representatives, two Senators nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, one Senator nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate and one Senator nominated by the Leader of the Australian Democratic Labor Party in the Senate.
 - (3) That every nomination of a member of the committee be forthwith notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 - (4) That the members of the committee hold office as a joint committee until the House of Representatives expires by dissolution or effluxion of time.
 - (5) That the committee elect as Chairman of the committee one of the members nominated by the Prime Minister or by the Leader of the Government in the Senate.
 - (6) That the Chairman of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the Deputy Chairman of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as Chairman of the committee at any time when the Chairman is not present at a meeting of the committee.
 - (7) That the committee have power to appoint sub-committees consisting of three or more of its members and to refer to any such sub-committee any of the matters which the committee is empowered to examine.
 - (8) That the committee have power to send for persons, papers and records, to move from place to place and to sit during any recess or adjournment of the Parliament.
 - (9) That the committee have leave to report from time to time and that any member of the committee have power to add a protest or dissent to any report.
 - (10) That five members of the committee constitute a quorum of the committee, and a majority of the members of a sub-committee constitute a quorum of that subcommittee.

- (11) That in matters of procedure the Chairman or Deputy Chairman presiding at the meeting have a deliberative vote and, in the event of an equality of voting, have a casting vote, and that, in other matters, the Chairman or Deputy Chairman have a deliberative vote only.
- (12) That the committee be provided with all necessary staff, facilities and resources.
- (13) That the committee or a sub-committee have power to authorise publication of any evidence given before it and any document presented to it.
- (14) That the committee may proceed to the despatch of business notwithstanding that all members of the committee have not been appointed and notwithstanding any vacancy on the committee.
- (15) That the foregoing provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.
- (16) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.
- Debate adjourned (Mr Sinclair—Deputy Leader of the Australian Country Party), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 26 COMMONWEALTH TEACHING SERVICE BILL 1973: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 61, dated 17 May 1973, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.
