- 1 The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following honourable Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Armitage, Mr Coates, Mr Holten, Dr Klugman and Mr MacKellar—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House move to make available to the Tasmanian Government a special grant for the purpose of securing Lake Pedder in its natural state.
 - Mr Jarman and Mr Peacock—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House acknowledge the right of every Australian child to equal grants of Government money spent on education and so instruct the proposed National Schools Commission.
 - Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr MacKellar, Mr McLeay and Mr McMahon—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.
 - Mr McMahon—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House see that television is used to build into the nation integrity, teamwork and a sense of purpose by serving, and to bring faith in God to the heart of the family and national life.

- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Crean (Treasurer), Mr Hayden (Minister for Social Security) was acting as Treasurer.
- 4 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 5 Suspension of standing orders moved: Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition) moved— That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the Prime Minister announcing to the House the decisions reached by the Government since his last press conference.
