TUESDAY, 5 MARCH 1974

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DISTINGUISHED VISITORS: Mr Speaker informed the House that a Parliamentary delegation from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, led by Mr N. M. Matchanov, was present in the gallery. On behalf of the House, Mr Speaker extended to the visitors a very warm welcome.
- 3 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (THE HONOURABLE D. A. CAMERON): Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable D. A. Cameron, and moved—That this House expresses its deep regret at the death on 5 January 1974 of the Honourable Donald Alistair Cameron, o.B.E., a member of this House for the Division of Oxley from 1949 to 1961, and a Minister of the Crown from 1956 to 1961, places on record its appreciation of his long and meritorious public service and tenders its profound sympathy to his widow and family in their bereavement.

And Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Anthony (Leader of the Australian Country Party), Mr Hayden (Minister for Social Security) and Mr Beazley (Minister for Education) having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Ouestion—passed.

- 4 APPOINTMENT OF SIR JOHN KERR AS GOVERNOR-GENERAL: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) informed the House that Her Majesty The Queen had graciously approved the appointment of the Honourable Sir John Kerr, K.C.M.G., as Governor-General of Australia and that Sir John would take up the appointment when Sir Paul Hasluck relinquished office at the end of June.
- 5 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Senator Willesee (Minister for Foreign Affairs), he was acting as Minister for Foreign Affairs.

6 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following honourable Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister), Mr Beazley (Minister for Education), Mr Adermann, Mr Bennett, Mr Bourchier, Mr Chipp, Mr Drummond, Mr Drury, Mr England, Mr Fairbairn, Mr Garland, Mr Gorton, Mr Hallett, Mr Killen, Mr McVeigh, Mr Staley, Mr Street and Mr Whan—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.

Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister), Mr Adermann, Mr Bourchier, Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Fairbairn, Mr Hunt, Mr Keogh, Mr Killen, Mr McVeigh, Mr Mulder and Mr Riordan—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House see that television is used to build into the nation integrity, teamwork and a sense of purpose by serving, and to bring faith in God to the heart of the family and national life.

- Mr Fisher and Mr King—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House urge the Government to include "God Save The Queen" in any referendum or poll to decide a national anthem.
- Mr Garland and Mr Kerin—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House immediately revoke all Australian whaling licences and ban the importation of all whale produce.
- Mr Bourchier—from certain electors of the Division of Bendigo praying that the Government take no measures to downgrade the post office at Elmore, Victoria, to unofficial status.
- Mr Hunt—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House acknowledge the right of every Australian child to equal grants of Government money spent on education and so instruct the proposed National Schools Commission.
- Mr Lamb—from a citizen of Australia praying that the House take urgent steps to ensure that all Australian citizens are eligible to vote for "God Save The Queen" in any poll or referendum to decide a national anthem and that the Government assure the House that it will not institute a republican system of government.
- Mr Luchetti—from certain electors of the Division of Macquarie praying that the House act to keep from television programs those elements which have a damaging effect upon the moral and social life of the community.
- Mr McVeigh—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House urge the Government to retain "God Save The Queen" as the national anthem until a referendum is held to select an anthem from "God Save The Queen" and the suggested alternatives.
- Mr McVeigh—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House not proceed with the Human Rights Bill.
- Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take steps to ensure that the Government does not site a second international airport for Sydney in the Galston area or surrounding suburbs.
- Mr Staley—from certain electors of Victoria praying that War Service Homes rights be granted immediately to all wartime ex-servicewomen.

Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved, by leave-

- (1) That this House, in accordance with the provisions of the *Parliamentary Papers*Act 1908-1963, authorises the publication of the report of the Auditor-General upon the Department of Aboriginal Affairs, dated March 1974, and
- (2) That the paper be printed.

Question—put and passed.

Mr Daly then moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hansen), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—POSTAL AND POST OFFICE SERVICES:

Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Fraser had proposed that a definite matter
of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure
of the Government to maintain adequate postal and post office services to the Australian community".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Fraser addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Mr Cooke rising to address the House-

Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved—That the business of the day be called on. Question—put and passed.

11 Suspension of standing orders—Constitution Alteration Bills: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved, pursuant to notice—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent each of the following Bills being presented and passed through all stages without delay: Constitution Alteration (Simultaneous Elections), Constitution Alteration (Democratic Elections), Constitution Alteration (Local Government Bodies), Constitution Alteration (Mode of Altering the Constitution) and Constitution Alteration (Inter-change of Powers).

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

12 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (SIMULTANEOUS ELECTIONS) BILL 1974: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution so as to ensure that Senate Elections are held at the same time as House of Representatives Elections. Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Snedden—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

13 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (DEMOCRATIC ELECTIONS) BILL 1974: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution so as to ensure that the Members of the House of Representatives and of the Parliaments of the States are chosen directly and democratically by the People.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Snedden—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

14 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (LOCAL GOVERNMENT BODIES) BILL 1974: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution to enable the Commonwealth to borrow Money for, and to grant Financial Assistance to, Local Government Bodies.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Snedden—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

15 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (MODE OF ALTERING THE CONSTITUTION) BILL 1974:

Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to facilitate alterations to
the Constitution and to allow Electors in Territories, as well as Electors in the States,
to vote at Referendums on Proposed Laws to alter the Constitution.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Snedden—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

16 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (INTER-CHANGE OF POWERS) BILL 1974: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution with respect to the Inter-change of Powers between the Commonwealth Parliament and the State Parliaments.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Snedden—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

17 CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (SIMULTANEOUS ELECTIONS) BILL 1974: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Ordered—That Mr Anthony (Leader of the Australian Country Party) be granted an extension of time.

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Morris), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

18 MOTION WITHOUT NOTICE—LEAVE TO MOVE NOT GRANTED: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) asked leave to move a motion without notice.

Objection being raised, leave not granted.

19 Suspension of Standing orders—Bills—Limitation of debate: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved—That, in relation to the proceedings on the following Bills, so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the Leader of the House making one declaration of urgency and moving one motion for the allotment of time in respect of all the Bills: Constitution Alteration (Simultaneous Elections) Bill 1974, Constitution Alteration (Democratic Elections) Bill 1974, Constitution Alteration (Mode of Altering the Constitution) Bill 1974 and Constitution Alteration (Inter-change of Powers) Bill 1974.
