Motion (*Mr. Kelly*) to recommit for the reconsideration of proposed section 151 of the Principal Act, negatived (on division), 171-2. Motion—That the House will to-morrow again resolve itself into the said Committee—Closure carried (on division) and motion agreed to (on division), 106. Committee (*continued*), 109, 124. Reported with an amendment, 124. Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to, 126. Adoption of Report moved, 126. Motion (*Mr. O'Malley*) to recommit for the reconsideration of Clause 6, in order to increase the salary from £3,000 to £6,000—Mr. Speaker stated that even if the Bill were recommitted, the honorable Member could not move such an increase, and he was not sure if he ought not to rule him out of order, and suggested that the motion should not be proceeded with—Motion, by leave, withdrawn, 126. On motion (*Mr. Deakin*) House ordered that Bill be allowed to pass through its remaining stages; report adopted; Bill read a third time, 146. Returned by Senate with amendments; Senate's amendments agreed to in House, 183. Assented to, 193. *Act No. 11 of 1909.*

**NAVAL LOAN BILL.**—Appropriation recommended by Governor-General, 210; Governor-General's Message considered in Committee and appropriation agreed to; Bill brought in and read a first time, 211. Second reading, 213, 214, 215 (on division). Committee, 215, 218. Reported with amendments and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill passed through remaining stages, 218. Agreed to by Senate without amendment, 227. Assented to, 237. *Act No. 14 of 1909.*
