- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PRIVILEGE—STATEMENT BY MR SPEAKER: Mr Speaker referred to the matter raised yesterday by Mr Fry and stated that he could not find in Mr Fry's remarks any precise instance of where the performance of the honourable Member's duties in the House had been affected. Accordingly, in his opinion, no prima facie case of a breach of privilege had been made out and the matter should not be accorded precedence over other business.
- 3 Peritions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

Mr Bonnett, Mr Hurford and Mr McVeigh—from certain citizens of Australia

praying that the Cadet forces be re-instated.

- Mr Street (Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations) and Mr Nixon (Minister for Transport)—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Metric Conversion Act be repealed and the traditional and familiar weights and measures be restored.
- Mr Ellicott (Attorney-General)—from Danny Sankey of Vaucluse, N.S.W., solicitor, praying that the House grant leave to the petitioner and his legal representatives to inspect the documents tabled in the House during the course of proceedings which took place between 2.55 p.m. and 10.09 p.m. on 9 July 1975, to issue and serve a subpoena for the production of the relevant official records of the aforesaid proceedings and of the relevant documents tabled therein and to issue and serve subpoenas for the attendance at the Queanbeyan Court, N.S.W., to give evidence of all those persons who took the official record of the aforesaid proceedings.
- Mr Calder—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the land rights of the citizens of Nhulunbuy, N.T. be protected in any relevant legislation before the Parliament.
- Dr Cass—from certain citizens of Australia praying that powers to vary income tax be not given to State Governments.
- Mr Connolly—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government remove or substantially increase the \$300 limit on income tax deductibility on personal residential land and water rates.
- Dr Klugman—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the introduction of television and radio licence fees, the imposition of a tax levy for Medibank and the introduction of higher charges for drugs dispensed under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme be prevented.
- Mr Morris—from certain citizens of Australia praying that a system of double income tax on personal incomes be not re-introduced.
