TUESDAY, 27 APRIL 1976

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), Mr Peacock (Minister for Foreign Affairs), Mr Killen (Minister for Defence), Mr Howard (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs), Mr Staley (Minister for the Capital Territory), Mr Brown, Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Connor, Dr Edwards, Mr Fisher, Mr Garland, Mr Groom, Mr Hayden, Mr Martin and Mr A. P. Whitlam—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government reverse the decision to cut 1975–76 overseas development assistance, reaffirm Australia's commitment of assistance of a minimum of 0.7% of G.N.P. and establish an independent statutory authority to administer such assistance.
 - Mr Uren (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) and Mr Morris—from certain citizens of Australia praying that a system of double income tax on personal incomes be not re-introduced.
 - Mr Peacock—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the export of mineral sands from Fraser Island be prohibited and the Queensland Government and other bodies be assisted to develop and conserve the natural environment of the Island.
 - Mr Aldred—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the conditions applying to NEAT system trainees approved prior to 1 April 1976 remain until these students complete their training.
 - Mr Bryant—from certain citizens of Australia praying that any proposal to build an Omega station on Australian soil be rejected.
 - Mr Connolly—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government remove or substantially increase the \$300 limit on income tax deductibility on personal residential land and water rates.
 - Mr Giles—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the mining of uranium in Australia be restricted to that needed for physical and bio-medical research and medical diagnosis.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Australian Assistance Plan be continued as a longer term program on a regional basis.
 - Mr Millar—from certain members of the Maryborough, Wide Bay and Burnett Historical Society praying that the Australian Heritage Commission be appointed urgently and grants be given to community organisations concerned with conservation.
 - Mr Sainsbury—from certain citizens of Australia in terms similar to the last preceding petition.

Mr Morris—from certain citizens of Australia praying that milk substitutes for children up to 6 years of age be restored to the schedule of Pharmaceutical Benefits.
