WEDNESDAY, 5 MAY 1976

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Connolly, Mr Cotter, Mr Fife, Mr FitzPatrick, Mr Garland, Mr Hayden, Mr Hodges, Mr Jones, Mr Jull, Mr Lusher, Mr MacKenzie, Mr W. McMahon, Mr Neil, Mr I. L. Robinson, Mr Ruddock, Mr Sainsbury, Mr Short, Mr Thomson and Mr Wentworth—from certain citizens of Australia praying that a Commission of Inquiry be initiated into the Aurukun Associates Agreement Act, no mining take place on the Aurukun Aboriginal Reserve until a full environmental impact study has been made and an export licence to the consortium concerned be refused until negotiations are held with the Aurukun people and an agreement has been reached.
 - Mr Killen (Minister for Defence), Mr Bonnett, Mr Cadman, Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Fife, Mr Hurford, Dr Richardson, Mr Ruddock, Mr Scholes and Mr Shipton —from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government reverse the decision to cut 1975-76 overseas development assistance, reaffirm Australia's commitment of assistance of a minimum of 0.7% of G.N.P. and establish an independent statutory authority to administer such assistance.

Whitlam—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the right of all trade union members to participate in ballots be guaranteed, voting in union elections be made compulsory and re-introduction of the collegiate system of union elections be resisted.
 - Mr Bonnett, Mr Chapman, Dr Jenkins and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Australian Heritage Commission be appointed urgently and grants be given to community organisations concerned with conservation.
 - Mr Bourchier—from certain members of the Bendigo Field Naturalists Club and North Central Environment Council; Mr Hamer—from certain members of the Mordialloc-Beaumaris Coastline Conservation League; Mr Jones—from certain members of the Newcastle East Residents' Group; and Mr Simon—from certain members of the La Trobe Valley Field Naturalists Club, in terms similar to the last preceeding petition.
 - Mr Peacock (Minister for Foreign Affairs), Mr Chipp and Mr Shipton—from certain citizens of Australia praying that no measures be taken to interfere with the Schools Commission.
