## THURSDAY, 9 SEPTEMBER 1976

- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Acting Speaker (Mr Lucock) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Acting Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Armitage, Mr J. L. McMahon, Mr Martin, Mr Morris, Mr Stewart and Mr A. P. Whitlam—from certain citizens praying that the M.V. *Australian Trader* be restored to the Tasmanian service.
  - Mr Fry, Mr J. L. McMahon, Mr Morris and Mr A. P. Whitlam—from certain citizens praying that the independence of the Australian Broadcasting Commission be maintained, advertising on the A.B.C. be rejected, public funding of the Commission be developed and any general inquiries into broadcasting be conducted publicly.
  - Mr Aldred, Mr Scholes and Mr Simon—from certain citizens praying that the Metric Conversion Act be repealed and the traditional and familiar weights and measures be restored.
  - Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry) and Mr Nixon (Minister for Transport)
    —from certain electors praying that chiropractors' fees be covered by health insurance and be tax deductible.
  - Mr Aldred and Mr Haslem—from certain citizens praying that discrimination against people of Croatian origin in Australia be remedied.
  - Mr Peacock (Minister for Foreign Affairs)—from certain citizens praying that social security payments be adjusted instantly and automatically with increases in the Consumer Price Index and certain other benefits be adjusted.
  - Mr Abel—from certain citizens praying that a licence be granted to 2RDJ FM Community Radio to operate a public access radio station to service the midwestern suburbs of Sydney.
  - Mr Beazley—from certain citizens praying that the House call on Sir John Kerr to resign as Governor-General.
  - Mr Chapman—from certain citizens praying that subsidies for nursing home patients be increased.
  - Mr Connolly—from certain citizens praying that the Government remove or substantially increase the \$300 limit on income tax deductibility on personal residential land and water rates.

Debate adjourned (Dr Cass), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 CUSTOMS TARIFF (COAL EXPORT DUTY) AMENDMENT BILL 1976: Mr Howard (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Customs Tariff (Coal Export Duty) Act 1975.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Howard moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Dr Cass), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 AIR NAVIGATION (CHARGES) AMENDMENT BILL 1976: Mr Nixon (Minister for Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Air Navigation (Charges) Act 1952.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Morris), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 EDUCATION AND TRAINING—COMMITTEE OF INQUIRY—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT AND PAPER—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Fraser (Prime Minister), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the appointment of a committee of inquiry into education and training, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following papers:

Education and training—Committee of inquiry—

Ministerial statement, 9 September 1976.

Terms of reference.

Mr MacKellar (Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs) moved—That the House take note of the papers.

Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bourchier), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 APPROPRIATION (URBAN PUBLIC TRANSPORT) BILL 1976: Mr Nixon (Minister for Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to appropriate Moneys out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the purpose of Urban Public Transport. Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Morris), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 FAMILY LAW AMENDMENT BILL (No. 2) 1976: Mr Ellicott (Attorney-General), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Family Law Act 1975.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Ellicott moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bowen), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 14 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1976-77—BUDGET DEBATE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr E. G. Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House condemns the Budget because—
  - (a) it pursues a policy of unemployment as a weapon to reduce real wages and salaries:
  - (b) it abdicates federal government responsibilities and forces the State governments and local governments either to reduce their services or institute additional charges, or both;
  - (c) it introduces an additional tax in the form of the Medibank levy, thus further reducing consumer spending;
  - (d) it reduces the availability of services to the whole community but particularly to those most vulnerable to hardship, notably Aborigines, the unemployed and migrants, and
  - (e) it fails to institute selective stimulatory expenditure to reduce unemployment and restore consumer confidence"—

Debate resumed.

Mr King addressing the House-
