- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

- 11 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1976-77-BUDGET DEBATE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time-And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr E. G. Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House condemns the Budget because-
 - (a) it pursues a policy of unemployment as a weapon to reduce real wages and salaries;
 - (b) it abdicates federal government responsibilities and forces the State governments and local governments either to reduce their services or institute additional charges, or both;
 - (c) it introduces an additional tax in the form of the Medibank levy, thus further reducing consumer spending;

- (d) it reduces the availability of services to the whole community but particularly to those most vulnerable to hardship, notably Aborigines, the unemployed and migrants, and
- (e) it fails to institute selective stimulatory expenditure to reduce unemployment and restore consumer confidence"—

Debate resumed.

Mr Wilson addressing the House-
