 - Mr Fraser—from certain citizens praying that the proposed amendments to the Conciliation and Arbitration Act, the Trade Practices Act and the law covering corporations not be proceeded with.
 - Dr Klugman—from certain members of the Service Station Association of N.S.W. Ltd and others praying that in implementing the findings of the Royal Commission on Petroleum the needs of the motoring public and the retail petroleum industry be given every consideration.
 - Mr Morris—from certain citizens praying that the House call on Sir John Kerr to resign as Governor-General.
 - Mr Morris—from certain citizens praying that a system of double income tax on personal incomes not be introduced.
 - Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying that a 5 year moratorium be placed on the mining and export of uranium and certain other action be taken in connection with uranium and a national energy policy.
 - Mr Ruddock—from certain electors praying that education policies and funding priorities reflect public concern and be based on needs, as expressed by certain education authorities.

Page 56, lines 14 and 15, omit ", the giving of the notice", substitute "and that Commission did not, before that date, give notice in writing to the corporation stating whether or not that Commission considered that any restraint of trade or commerce resulting from the contract had, or was likely to have, a significant effect upon competition, the giving of the notice by the corporation".

Page 56, lines 30 and 31, omit ", the giving of the notice", substitute "and that Commission did not, before that date, give notice in writing to the corporation stating whether or not that Commission considered that any restraint of trade or commerce resulting from the contract had, or was likely to have, a significant effect upon competition, the giving of the notice by the corporation".

Page 57, lines 4 and 5, omit ", the giving of the notice", substitute "and that Commission did not, before that date, give notice in writing to the corporation stating whether or not that Commission considered that the proposed acquisition would be likely to have the effect of substantially lessening competition in a market for goods or services, the giving of the notice by the corporation".

Clause 58—

Page 65, lines 8 and 9, omit "(other than conduct referred to in sub-section 47 (13))".

Page 65, omit proposed sub-paragraph (i), substitute the following sub-paragraph:

- "(i) made a determination dismissing the application, not being a determination made in circumstances where the corporation gave a notice in relation to that conduct under sub-section 92 (1) or 93 (1) of the *Trade Practices Act* 1974 as in force immediately before the commencement of the *Trade Practices Amendment Act* 1977 and—
 - (A) in the case of a notice given under sub-section 92 (1) of the *Trade Practices Act* 1974 as so in force—a notice was given to the corporation under sub-section 92 (2) of that Act; or
 - (B) in the case of a notice given under sub-section 93 (1) of the *Trade Practices Act* 1974 as so in force—no notice was given to the corporation under sub-section 93 (2) of that Act; or ".

Clause 61, page 71, after proposed sub-section (4) insert the following sub-section:

"'(4A) Sub-section (4) does not apply in relation to a document that was produced to the Commission in pursuance of a notice under section 155.".

Clause 67, page 74, line 15, after "person" insert "and upon payment of the prescribed fee (if any)".

Clause 69, page 75, omit the clause, substitute the following clause:

"69. Section 159 of the Principal Act is amended—

- (a) by omitting the words 'the Tribunal or' (wherever occurring); answers.
- (b) by omitting from sub-section (1) the words '(including a person appearing before the Commission under section 155)' ".

Remainder of Bill, as amended, agreed to.
