- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Connolly, Mr Ellicott, Mr Gillard, Mr Kerin, Mr Neil and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of pornographic material involving children.
 - Mr N. A. Brown, Mr Lloyd, Mr Lusher, Mr MacKenzie and Mr Yates—from certain citizens praying that the Medical Benefits Schedule be amended to preclude payment of benefits for abortions.
 - Mr Ellicott and Mr J. L. McMahon—from certain citizens praying that the position of staff elected commissioner of the Australian Broadcasting Commission continue and that the election of a new commissioner proceed.
 - Mr Hurford and Mr Uren—from certain citizens praying for the replacement of the 1978-79 Budget by a budget which increases the level of economic activity, lowers unemployment, assists the disadvantaged and revives business and consumer confidence.
 - Mr Jarman and Mr C. K. Jones—from certain citizens praying that item 6469 be removed from the standard medical benefits table.
 - Mr Bradfield—from certain citizens praying that the former post office building in Kogarah, N.S.W., be given to the people of Kogarah as a women's rest centre and community aid centre.
 - Dr Cass—from certain citizens praying that handcrafted articles be exempted from sales tax and certain other action be taken in relation to the Sales Tax (Exemptions and Classifications) Act.
 - Mr Connolly—from certain citizens praying that a broadly representative Schools Commission be maintained to determine national priorities in education and other matters.
 - Mr Fisher—from certain citizens praying that any request from Jacob Prai and Otto Ondowame for political asylum in Australia be approved.
 - Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that lone fathers receive a pension on the same basis as supporting mothers.
 - Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that the Medical Benefits Schedule be amended to preclude payment of benefits for any abortion except one performed when the mother's life is endangered.
 - Mr Holding—from certain citizens praying that the Parliament debate the Report of the Royal Commission on Human Relationships, facilitate public debate and take certain other action in connection with the Report.
 - Mr Jarman—from certain citizens of Nunawading, Vic., praying that the Social Security Act be amended to permit unemployment beneficiaries to work part-time without loss of all unemployment benefits.
 - Mr Jarman—from certain citizens praying that the imperial system of weights and measures be restored.

Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that pensions be increased twice yearly in line with rises in the consumer price index.

Mr Lusher—from certain citizens praying for a halt in the automation of rural telephone exchanges pending a Parliamentary inquiry.

Mr Lusher—from certain residents of the Electoral Division of Cunningham praying that support be given to the general business motion of the honourable Member for Hume concerning medical benefits for abortion.

Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that expenditure on post-school education and Government schools be substantially increased and that certain other action be taken in connection with post-school education.

Mr Viner—from certain citizens praying that items which currently permit benefits for abortion be removed from the Standard Medical Benefits Table and that other funding of medical benefits schemes for the same purpose cease.

6 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—HEALTH INSURANCE: Mr Speaker informed the House that both Dr Klugman and Mr Shack had proposed that definite matters of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion today. In accordance with the provisions of standing order 107, he had given priority to the matter proposed by Dr Klugman, namely, "The failure of the Government to adequately and equitably provide for the health insurance needs of the community".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Dr Klugman addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

7 Message from the Senate—Weights and Measures (National Standards) Amendment Bill 1978: Message No. 150, dated 7 November 1978, from the Senate was reported transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to amend the 'Weights and Measures (National Standards) Act 1960'".

Bill read a first time.

Mr Garland (Minister representing the Minister for Science) moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Cohen), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 Public Works Committee—Reference of work—Garden Island Dockyard, N.S.W.—Workshop, amenities building and services: Mr McLeay (Minister for Construction), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1969, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report: Garden Island Dockyard, N.S.W.—Workshop, amenities building and services.

Mr McLeay presented plans in connection with the proposed work. Question—put and passed.

9 TASMANIA GRANT (THE MOUNT LYELL MINING AND RAILWAY COMPANY LIMITED) AMEND-MENT BILL (No. 2) 1978: The order of the day having been read for the further consideration of the Bill in committee, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, as a whole-

On the motion of Mr E. L. Robinson (Minister for Finance), the following amendment was made, after debate: Clause 3, omit the clause, substitute the following clause:

"3. Section 3 of the Principal Act is amended by—

Approval of

(a) omitting '30 June 1978' and substituting '30 September 1978'; execution of agreements and

(b) adding at the end thereof the following sub-section:

- '(2) Approval is given to the execution, on behalf of the Commonwealth, of an agreement or agreements between the Commonwealth and Tasmania for the payment by the Commonwealth to Tasmania, for the purpose of assisting the continuation of the operation of The Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited's mine at Mount Lyell in Tasmania from 1 October 1978 to 30 June 1980, inclusive, of amounts not exceeding in the aggregate whichever is the lesser of—
 - (a) one-half of the sum of any payments made by Tasmania to the Company for the purpose of assisting the continuation of the operation of that mine during that period; or

(b) \$3,800,000.".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with an amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Millar reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr E. L. Robinson, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

10 STATES GRANTS (CAPITAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1978: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Mr Willis moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the Bill, the House is of the opinion that the Bill—

- (1) takes no account of the Government's responsibility to allocate resources efficiently and equitably,
- (2) will further retard provision of infrastructure essential to the effective functioning of the economy.
- (3) will further depress the already severely depressed building and construction industry and
- (4) will further increase unemployment".

Debate continued.

Ordered—That Mr J. J. Brown be granted an extension of time.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

13 BOUNTY (METAL-WORKING MACHINE TOOLS) BILL 1978: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.
