- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Baume, Mr Bowen, Mr Burns, Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Connolly, Mr Falconer, Mr Hunt, Mr L. R. Johnson, Sir William McMahon, Mr Macphee, Mr Neil, Mr O'Keefe, Mr Peacock, Mr Sainsbury, Mr Shipton, Mr Simon, Mr Staley, Mr Stewart and Mr Yates—from certain citizens praying that the Medical Benefits Schedule be amended to preclude payment of benefits for abortions.
 - Mr Baume, Mr Burns, Mr Burr, Mr Fry, Mr Howard, Mr L. R. Johnson, Mr B. O. Jones, Mr J. L. McMahon, Mr Morris, Mr Neil, Mr O'Keefe, Mr I. L. Robinson, Mr Scholes, Mr Uren and Mr West—from certain citizens praying that pension payments be restored to twice-yearly adjustments and that pensions and unemployment benefits be raised to 30% of average weekly earnings.
 - Mr Braithwaite, Mr FitzPatrick, Mr Hodges, Mr Howard, Mr P. F. Johnson, Mr Martyr, Mr Neil, Mr Porter and Mr Scholes—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of pornographic material involving children.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson and Mr Johnston—from certain citizens praying that indirect tax measures, such as a retail turnover tax or a value added tax, not be introduced.
 - Mr Aldred—from certain citizens praying that the taxation law be amended to permit registered tax agents to trade for a full year and lodge income tax returns at the close of the respective tax year.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that pensions be increased twice yearly in line with rises in the consumer price index.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying that the decision to index pensions annually be reviewed and that all pensions be adjusted quarterly.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying for the rejection of any legislation introducing annual adjustments of pension rates.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying that Kingsford-Smith Airport, Sydney, not be extended and that no related decisions be taken without consultation with affected communities.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying for the elimination of discriminatory aspects of the new point to point airfares as they relate to citizens not residing in Sydney or Melbourne.
 - Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying for continued and increased Federal subsidies to maintain all existing South Australian country rail services.
 - Mr Shack—from certain citizens praying that item 6469 on the Medical Benefits Schedule be maintained.
 - Mr Uren—from certain citizens praying that the House reject the motion of the honourable Member for Hume concerning medical benefits for abortion and support abortion as a claimable item under all health benefits.

 - Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- > SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS---MOTION OF CENSURE OF THE PRIME MINISTER: Mr Sinclair (Leader of the House), by leave, moved-That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the Leader of the Opposition moving forthwith a motion of censure of the Prime Minister.

- 6 PRIME MINISTER—MOTION OF CENSURE: Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) moved— That this House censures the Prime Minister for-
 - (1) his failure to ensure and maintain the unqualified support of his Ministry, and
 - (2) his contemptuous rejection of long-established precedents of the Westminster system of government by his failure to provide the Parliament with a full explanation of the reasons for the resignation and subsequent re-instatement of the Minister for Finance.
