### WEDNESDAY, 27 FEBRUARY 1980

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Burns, Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Howe, Mr L. K. Johnson and Mr Scholes—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished
  - Mr Fisher and Mr O'Keefe—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the 1980 level of education expenditure to Government schools be restored and increased in real terms.
  - Mr Bowen—from certain citizens praying that the Human Rights Commission Bill 1979 and the Racial Discrimination Amendment Bill 1979 be returned to the Senate so that all elected Senators are able to be present and vote on the legislation.
  - Mr J. J. Brown—from certain electors of the Electoral Division of Maranoa praying that the present policy of taxing fuel to the extent of maintaining world oil price parity be modified to exclude rural people from this tax.
  - Dr Cass—from certain citizens praying that the laws relating to sexual offences against women be revised to give greater protection to victims.
  - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain sports men and women and others praying that the participation of a full Australian contingent at the Moscow Olympic Games be ensured.
  - Mr Kerin—from certain citizens praying that positive policies be adopted to reduce unemployment and that certain social security benefits be granted.
  - Mr Morris—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be maintained and Federal Government support for its activities be increased.
  - Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying for the abolition of the export parity pricing policy for LPG consumed in Australia and that certain other action be taken in relation to the pricing of LPG.
  - Mr Short—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council and its recommendations be supported.

- 4 AFGHANISTAN—INVASION BY SOVIET UNION—AUSTRALIAN LABOR PARTY RESPONSE: Mr Viner (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That this House is of the opinion that the Australian Labor Party, led by the Leader of the Opposition, is seeking to undermine the efforts of Australia and other like-minded nations to establish an effective response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan which would bring home to the Soviet Government and people the grave threat to world peace of the Soviet action.

Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" (first occurring) be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "this House is of the opinion that the Government should be condemned for not seeking a bi-partisan policy in relation to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and for its deliberate attempts to seek political advantage by the adoption of double standards in sanctions against the Soviet Union".

Page 1, after clause 2 insert the following new clause:

"2A. The long title of the Principal Act is amended by adding 'and the financing of the Australian Capital Territory'.".

Amendments-

Clause 3, page 2, lines 4 and 5, omit "financing of works and services provided in respect of", substitute "receipt and expenditure of public funds within".

Clause 3, page 2, proposed section 16B, omit sub-section (2), substitute the following sub-section:

"'(2) In sub-section (1), "receipt and expenditure of public funds" includes all aspects of public finance whether of a type normally provided or collected by Commonwealth, State or local governments either together or separately.'.".

Debate continued.

It being 10.30 p.m.—Progress to be reported.
