# TUESDAY, 15 APRIL 1980

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Anthony, Mr James, Mr Lynch, Mr MacKellar, Mr MacKenzie and Mr Macphee—from certain citizens praying that pensions and benefits be increased and adjusted quarterly and that greater taxation relief be given to pensioners and others on low incomes.
  - Mr Burns, Mr Carlton, Mr Goodluck, Mr Hyde and Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that taxation laws be amended to increase incentives to persons providing for their own retirement benefits.
  - Mr Goodluck, Mr Hyde, Dr Klugman, Mr Ruddock and Mr Wilson—from certain citizens praying that tax laws be reformed to allow joint incomes to be equally divided, for taxation purposes, between husband and wife.
  - Mr Connolly and Mr Howard—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of pornographic material involving children.
  - Mr Ellicott and Mr J. L. McMahon—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be maintained and Federal Government support for its activities be increased.
  - Mr D. M. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to reduce the excise duty on Australian rum.
  - Mr Connolly—from certain citizens praying that laws be passed to outlaw discrimination in employment and in the provision of unemployment benefits, based upon race, ethnic origin, marital status and sex.
  - Mr Dean—from certain citizens praying that the Government approve proposals such as that by Ansett Airlines of Australia to operate a service between Townsville, Qld, and Singapore via Darwin, and that an international airport in North Queensland be proceeded with.
  - Mr Haslem—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to allow child-care expenses as a deductible item from taxpayers' assessable income.
  - Mr Howard—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of oil exploration within the Great Barrier Reef region and that the entire region be declared a Marine Park.
  - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying that the Human Rights Commission Bill 1979 and the Racial Discrimination Amendment Bill 1979 be redrafted to ensure that the rights of all ethnic groups are enhanced.
  - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying for the rejection of proposed plans for the Franklin power development of the Lower Gordon, in the southwest of Tasmania.
  - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain sports men and women and others praying that the participation of a full Australian contingent at the Moscow Olympic Games be ensured.

Mr Johnston—from certain citizens praying that certain religious organizations be investigated with a view to introducing appropriate legislation to restrict their activities.

10 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—MINISTER FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND COLLECTIVE RESPONSIBILITY OF CABINET: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Bowen (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Foreign Minister to observe the convention of collective responsibility in his preempting Cabinet in relation to Australia's response to the crisis in Iran".

12 States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Amendment Bill 1980: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Willis who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the Bill, the House is of the opinion that the Bill is grossly deficient in that it—

- (1) only guarantees the States a minimum entitlement to general financial assistance in 1980-81 which is of lower real value per capita than the level of such payments in 1979-80;
- (2) provides this inadequate guarantee for only 1 year, after which the only guarantee for the States is that the total money amount of such payments will not be reduced in future years, a guarantee which would allow continuing reductions in the value of such payments in future years;

- (3) in combination with the severe reductions in the real value of specific purpose payments to the States, will place the States in acute financial difficulty, and
- (4) will accordingly place great pressure on the States to introduce a second income tax as provided for by the Fraser Government's new federalism".
