THURSDAY, 17 APRIL 1980

- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Dr Cass, Mr Fry, Mr Holding and Mr Kerin—from certain citizens praying that positive policies be adopted to reduce unemployment and that certain social security benefits be granted.
 - Mr Carlton, Mr Cotter and Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that taxation laws be amended to increase incentives to persons providing for their own retirement benefits.
 - Mr Burns and Mr Howe—from certain citizens praying that pensions and benefits be increased and adjusted quarterly and that greater taxation relief be given to pensioners and others on low incomes.
 - Mr Calder and Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished.
 - Mr Dawkins and Mr Shack—from certain citizens praying that eligibility for service pensions be extended to include merchant seamen.
 - Mr James and Mr Lucock—from certain residents of Greta, N.S.W., praying that steps be taken to persuade the Australian Telecommunications Commission not to move the External Plant School from its present site.
 - Mr Bradfield—from certain citizens praying that the proposal to increase the marine radio licence fee be reconsidered.
 - Mr Bradfield—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the 1980 level of education expenditure to Government schools be restored and increased in real terms.
 - Mr J. J. Brown—from certain sports men and women and others praying that the participation of a full Australian contingent at the Moscow Olympic Games be ensured.
 - Mr Burns—from certain citizens praying that action be taken to prohibit the use of public moneys for the killing of the unborn.
 - Mr Calder—from certain citizens praying that tax laws be reformed to allow joint incomes to be equally divided, for taxation purposes, between husband and wife.
 - Mr D. M. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to reduce the excise duty on Australian rum.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that legislation be introduced to require labelling of perfumes, cosmetics and toilet preparations to indicate any use of animal ingredients during manufacture.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that the special pension entitlement be extended to a deceased pensioner's next-of-kin where that person is also a pensioner and bears the financial responsibility for the burial.
 - Mr Porter—from certain electors praying that the Citizen's Band Radio Service known as the High Frequency Band be allowed to continue after 1 July 1982.

Mr Simon—from certain citizens praying that the import parity price levy on transport fuel be reduced by 15 cents per litre for 12 months.

Mr Yates—from certain electors of the Electoral Division of Holt praying that the export of aged and sick horses be prohibited.

Mr Young—from certain citizens praying that early optional retirement at age 60 with full pension entitlements be introduced to relieve unemployment.

8 FOREIGN OWNERSHIP AND CONTROL OF AUSTRALIAN RESOURCES—PROPOSED SELECT COMMITTEE: Mr Hurford, pursuant to notice, moved—That a select committee of this House be appointed to inquire into and report on the growing foreign ownership and control of Australian resources and to make recommendations concerning the need to reverse this trend and to establish adequate code-of-conduct guidelines for those foreign companies operating in Australia.

Debate ensued.

Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for general business notices: Mr E. L. Robinson (Minister for Finance), by leave, moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the consideration of general business notices being continued until 1 p.m.

Question—put and passed.

Debate continued.

11 TASMANIAN NATIVE FORESTRY AGREEMENT BILL 1980: Mr Nixon (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to an agreement between the Commonwealth and Tasmania in connection with Tasmanian native forestry.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Morris), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 13 Liquefied Petroleum Gas (Grants) Bill 1980: Mr Garland (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant financial assistance to the States and the Northern Territory in connection with the prices, when sold for certain non-commercial uses, of liquefied petroleum gas and gas produced by the use of liquefied petroleum gas or naphtha.

Bill read a first time.

18 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 3) 1979-80: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed by Mr Willis who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not

opposing the provisions of the Bill, the House—

(a) notes the failure, and rejects the inherent implausibility, of the Government's policies of—

(i) fighting inflation by raising prices,

(ii) encouraging employment by increasing unemployment, and

(iii) improving living standards by reducing wages:

- (b) deplores the accelerating increases in the rate of inflation and interest rates;
- (c) opposes the continuing suppression of Australian economic activity which has caused 4 years of depressed economic growth rates, declining living standards and rising unemployment;
- (d) rejects the growing burden of income tax and petrol tax and their increasingly inequitable incidence;
- (e) expresses alarm at the continuing deterioration of the social infrastructure and essential community services resulting from 4 years of falling real expenditure, and

(f) deplores the effects of these policies which have been to make Australia an increasingly unjust, economically insecure and fragmented society".

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Armitage), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

19 Message from the Senate—Pipeline Construction (Dalton to Canberra) Bill 1980: Message No. 415, dated 16 April 1980 from the Senate was reported transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to authorize the construction by the Pipeline Authority of a pipeline from Dalton in New South Wales to Canberra in the Australian Capital Territory".

Bill read a first time.

Mr Fife (Minister for Education) moved—That the Bill be now read a second time. Debate adjourned (Dr Cass), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

20 WOOL INDUSTRY AMENDMENT BILL 1980: Mr Nixon (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Wool Industry Act 1972. Bill read a first time.
