- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Acting Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Humphreys, Mr Jacobi, Mr J. L. McMahon, Mr Morris and Mr Mountford—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to sell Trans Australia Airlines be rejected.
 - Mr Beazley, Mr J. L. McMahon and Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to allow child-care expenses as a deductible item from taxpayers' assessable income.
 - Mr Howe, Mr Kent and Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to deny unemployment benefits to unemployed persons under 18 years of age be unconditionally withdrawn and that certain other action be taken in regard to unemployment benefits and employment policies.
 - Mr Beazley—from certain residents of Western Australia praying that steps be taken to formulate an airline policy providing for greater competition so that prices and service are determined by free market forces.
 - Mr R. J. Brown—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the allocation of funds for government school programs be restored and substantially increased
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that legislation be introduced to require labelling of perfumes, cosmetics and toilet preparations to indicate any use of animal ingredients during manufacture.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that legislation be enacted to require the production of annual statistics on the numbers of live animals involved in research and that the National Health and Medical Research Council be required to develop humane and responsible standards of conduct for research using live animals in laboratories.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that requests for export permits covering mineral sand products from Moreton Island, Qld, be refused.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to increase the amount of extra income which pensioners and benefit recipients can earn in order that they are not penalised by small fluctuations in their earnings.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished.
 - Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the government of the United States of America be urged to cease all military aid to El Salvador and support be given to the freedom of the Salvadorian people against the governing military dictatorship.
 - Mr Kerin—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to legislate for the establishment of plant variety rights in Australia be rejected.

- Mr J. L. McMahon—from certain citizens praying that laws be passed to outlaw discrimination in employment and in the provision of unemployment benefits, based upon race, ethnic origin, marital status and sex.
- Mr Mountford—from certain citizens praying that funding of children's services be restored to at least the real value of funding allocated in the 1975–76 Budget and future allocations be spent in full for the purposes designated.
- Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that insulin syringes for diabetics be made available on the National Health Scheme and insulin prescriptions revert to 10 bottles.
- Mr Viner—from certain citizens praying that drugs deleted from the pharmaceutical benefits scheme free list be restored.

- 5 Taxation—Proposed select committee: Mr Willis, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House, being greatly concerned at the apparent continuing erosion of the equity of the tax system, calls on the Government to establish a select committee on taxation to investigate and report on—
 - (1) the extent to which the income tax schedules established by the Parliament are related to the capacity of taxpayers to pay;
 - (2) the degree to which the nominal incidence of taxation under these schedules is distorted by the impact of tax avoidance and tax evasion;
 - (3) the impact on the equity of the tax system of the increased incidence of indirect taxation:
 - (4) the impact on the equity of the tax system of a greater proportion of tax revenue being collected from indirect taxation in the future, and
 - (5) the need for changes to the present system, the introduction of new taxes or other measures which can be used to restore equity to the tax system.

Debate ensued.
