- 1 The House met, at 1.45 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 3 AUSTRALIA-CHINA COUNCIL—ANNUAL REPORT 1980-81—PAPER AND MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Street (Minister for Foreign Affairs), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Australia-China Council—3rd Annual Report, for year 1980-81—

and, by leave, made a ministerial statement in connection with the paper.

- Mr Bowen (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 4 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—TASMANIA'S ECONOMY: Mr Deputy Speaker informed the House that Dr Blewett had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The neglect by the Federal Government of the real needs of the Tasmanian economy".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Dr Blewett addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

- 5 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Fisher, Mr Giles, Mr Hicks and Mr Lloyd—from certain electors of the Electoral Divisions of Mallee, Wakefield, Riverina and Murray, respectively, praying that the liquefied petroleum gas subsidy be extended for a further 3 years and that a specific appropriation be included in the 1982-83 Budget.
 - Mr Bradfield and Mr O'Keefe—from certain citizens praying that no further tax be imposed on those items needed for the educational progress of Australia's

students.

- Mr Braithwaite and Mr Dean—from certain residents of north Queensland praying that sufficient expenditure be allocated to raise the standard of the national highway in north Queensland to Department of Transport standards.
- Mrs Darling and Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that Australia call on the Canadian Government to end the harp seal hunt and halt the importation of products derived from the harp seal.
- Mr Duffy and Mr Lloyd—from certain citizens praying that any proposal for an increase in tobacco excise be rejected.
- Mr Beazley—from certain citizens praying that a curfew be implemented and a parallel runway constructed at Perth Airport and legislation be introduced to allow payment for injurious affection.
- Mr Beazley—from certain citizens praying that plans to close Cloverdale North Post Office, W.A., be abandoned.

Mr Cross—from certain citizens praying that the Commonwealth's constitutional and legislative powers be used to grant full land rights and self-management to the Aboriginal people of Queensland.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that Family Radio Limited's application for a broadcasting licence be supported and more category "S" F.M. licences be made available in Brisbane.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that the Sex Discrimination Bill 1981 be passed.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that the proposed sales tax on books, magazines and newspapers be withdrawn from the Budget proposals.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to establish a ceiling on the allowable amount of savings in pensioners' non-interest bearing accounts not be proceeded with.

Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that carcass trade be promoted and that exports of live animals for slaughter be banned.

Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to prevent sand mining on Moreton Island, Old, and that action be taken to declare Moreton Island a national park.

Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that the importation of marine mammal by-products be banned and an international ban on the slaughter of marine mammals be supported.

Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that legislation be enacted to require the production of annual statistics on the numbers of live animals involved in research and that the National Health and Medical Research Council be required to develop humane and responsible standards of conduct for research using live animals in laboratories.

Mr Maher—from certain citizens praying that all provisions of the Heritage Act and the Environment Protection (Impact of Proposals) Act be fully complied with in respect of national estate areas.

Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that funds be provided to ensure the continuing effectiveness of the Family Planning Association of Victoria.

Dr Theophanous—from certain citizens praying that the latest increase in taxes be stopped and a referendum be held on taxes and interest rates.

Dr Theophanous—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to re-introduce a system of health care based on ability to pay and that access to health care be based on medical need.

6 INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT AMENDMENT BILL 1982: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Willis who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the Bill, the House is of the opinion that it is deficient in that—

(1) penalties contained in the Bill for participation in transfer pricing type tax avoidance arrangements are insufficient to provide suitable deterrents against tax avoidance and are inconsistent with penalties contained elsewhere in the Act;

(2) without the accompanying adoption of a code of conduct for transnational corporations, as recommended by the OECD and the United Nations, the effectiveness of Division 13 is likely to be limited by the difficulty confronting the Taxation Commissioner in obtaining adequate information;

(3) the Bill fails to take retrospective action against persons flouting the tax system through the blatant avoidance schemes utilising section 26AAA of the Act, and

(4) the Bill endorses use by the medical profession of corporate and trust arrangements with significant tax avoidance implications".
