4 AUSTRALIA'S DEMOGRAPHIC TRENDS 1982 AND THE 1982-83 IMMIGRATION PROGRAM—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT AND PAPER—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Macphee (Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs), by leave, made a ministerial statement relating to Australia's demographic trends and the 1982-83 immigration program, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following papers:

6 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE—REPORT—STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS: Mr Connolly (Chairman) presented the following report from the Joint Committee of Public Accounts:

Mr Connolly and Dr Theophanous, by leave, made statements in connection with the report.

7 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—GOVERNMENT HEALTH SCHEME: Mr Deputy Speaker informed the House that Dr Blewett had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The inflationary impact, the social cost and the bureaucratic ineptitude of the latest Government health scheme".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Dr Blewett addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

8 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Macphee and Mr Thomson—from certain citizens praying

that any proposal for an increase in tobacco excise be rejected.

Mr Falconer, Mr Nixon and Mr Wilson—from certain electors of the Electoral Divisions of Casey, Gippsland and Sturt, respectively, praying that the liquefied petroleum gas subsidy be extended for a further 3 years and that a specific appropriation be included in the 1982-83 Budget.

Mrs Child and Mr McMahon—from certain citizens praying that Australia call on the Canadian Government to end the harp seal hunt and halt the importation of

products derived from the harp seal.

Mrs Darling and Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that Family Radio Limited's application for a broadcasting licence be supported and more category "S" F.M. licences be made available in Brisbane.

Mr Braithwaite—from certain residents of north Queensland praying that sufficient expenditure be allocated to raise the standard of the national highway in north Queensland to Department of Transport standards.

Mrs Child—from certain citizens praying that insulin syringes for diabetics be made available on the National Health Scheme and insulin prescriptions revert to 10 bottles.

Mrs Child—from certain citizens praying that sanitary products for women be brought under the scrutiny of the Australian Drug Evaluation Committee and certain other actions be taken in regard to the possible threat posed to the health of women by toxic shock syndrome.

Mr Cross—from certain citizens praying that the Commonwealth's constitutional and legislative powers be used to grant full land rights and self-management to the Aboriginal people of Queensland.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that their concern for Marie-France Claude and their wish that she be released from prison be passed on to the Haitian Government.

Mr Hurford—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the Aboriginal Community College and the wider Aboriginal community be consulted before any decision is reached on the future of the College and that control over the College remain in the hands of the Aboriginal community.

Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the present children's services program be maintained and no recommendations of the Spender report be implemented

without full consultation with community groups.

Mr McLeay—from certain citizens praying that funding of children's services be restored to at least 1975-76 levels, a standardised means test not be imposed on the users of child care services and the stated intention to use public funds to supplement private sector children's services not be implemented.

Mr McLeay—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to allow child-care

expenses as a deductible item from taxpayers' assessable income.

Mr McLeay—from certain citizens praying that the Sex Discrimination Bill 1981 be passed.

Mr Nixon—from certain citizens praying that no plant variety rights legislation be enacted and a public inquiry be called into the impact of existing overseas schemes.

Dr Theophanous—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to re-introduce a system of health care based on ability to pay and that access to health care be based on medical need.

Petitions received.

- 9 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY: Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 to 19, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 10 DEFENCE—STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENTS AND PROGRAM CHANGES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PAPER NOTED: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr N. A. Brown (Minister for Employment and Youth Affairs)—That the House take note of the paper (presented on 29 April 1982) viz.:

Defence -- Strategic developments and program changes -- Ministerial statement, 29

April 1982—

And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Scholes, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House—

- (1) condemns the Government for its persistent failure to implement its own announced defence programs and for its failure to define clearly defence policies and force structure and equipment programs to meet Australian defence requirements;
- (2) directs the Government to immediately prepare and present a definitive statement on defence policy, Australia's strategic position and forward planning for the structure and equipment of the Australian Defence Force, and
- (3) notes that the most recent definitive policy statement on defence of November 1976 is no longer relevant to the Government's actual defence programs nor the current strategic situation"—

Debate resumed.

Amendment, by leave, withdrawn.

Debate continued on the question—That the House take note of the paper.

Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words—"this House expresses its want of confidence in the Government because of—

(1) its failure to enunciate a clear defence strategy for Australia;

(2) its persistent failure to maintain its announced defence programs, and

(3) the confusion and distortions in defence planning which have seriously weakened Australia's security".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put. The House divided (the Deputy Speaker, Mr Millar, in the Chair)—

And so it was resolved in the affirmative.

Question—That the House take note of the paper—put and passed.

11 RADIOCOMMUNICATIONS LICENCE FEES BILL 1982: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Communications) presented a Bill for an Act to provide for the payment of fees in respect of licences under the Wireless Telegraphy Act 1905.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bowen—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 RADIOCOMMUNICATIONS (MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS) BILL 1982: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Communications) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Wireless Telegraphy Act 1905 and the Overseas Telecommunications Act 1946 and to provide for certain matters consequential upon the enactment of the Radiocommunications Licence Fees Act 1982.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bowen—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 STATUTE LAW (MISCELLANEOUS AMENDMENTS) BILL (NO. 1) 1982: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Macphee (Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs), the Bill was read a third time.

14 ALBURY-WODONGA DEVELOPMENT (FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE) AMENDMENT BILL 1982: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Mr Cunningham addressing the House-

Adjournment negatived: It being 10 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mr Hunt (Minister for Transport) requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate—

Question—put and negatived.

Mr Cunningham continued his speech.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hunt, the Bill was read a third time.

15 CUSTOMS TARIFF (ANTI-DUMPING) AMENDMENT (COUNTERVAILING DUTIES) BILL 1982: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr N. A. Brown (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs), the Bill was read a third time.

- 16 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDER OF THE DAY: Ordered—That order of the day No. 4, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 17 CRIMES AMENDMENT BILL 1981: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

#### In the committee

Clauses 1 to 5, by leave, taken together, and agreed to.

Clause 6—

On the motion of Mr Viner (Minister representing the Attorney-General), the following amendment was made, after debate: Page 4, lines 18 and 19, omit paragraph (1) (d).

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 7 omitted.

Remainder of Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr Robinson reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Viner, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

18 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Viner (Minister for Industrial Relations) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at 11.14 p.m., adjourned until tomorrow at 1.45 p.m.
