TUESDAY, 10 MAY 1983

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

12 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—HEALTH INSURANCE INDUSTRY: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Carlton had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The grave threat to the jobs of 5000 Australians in the health insurance industry posed by the Government's centralisation of health insurance".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

13 REFERENDUM (CONSTITUTION ALTERATION) AMENDMENT BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to, after debate. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Millar reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Young (Special Minister of State), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

16 EXCISE TARIFF AMENDMENT BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Moore who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House notes that the Government has failed to honour its election commitment to reduce the price of petrol by 3 cents per

litre and its pre-election undertaking to disregard currency fluctuations in setting the price of Australian produced crude oil".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr J. J. Brown (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry and Commerce), the Bill was read a third time
