THURSDAY, 19 MAY 1983

- The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

 - Mr Bowen—from certain citizens praying that podiatry services be extended to cover all pensioners.
 - Mr Hollis—from certain residents of New South Wales in the same terms as the last preceding petition.
 - Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the findings of the Major Airport Needs of Sydney Committee be endorsed and proposals for an airport at Scheyville, N.S.W., be rejected.
 - Mr R. F. Edwards—from certain citizens praying that urgent consideration be given to removing the anomalies and hardships of student allowances schemes in respect of the Tertiary Admittance Examination.
 - Mr Groom—from certain residents of Tasmania praying that legislation to protect the Franklin River in south-west Tasmania be passed at the earliest opportunity.
 - Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that the Government ratify the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.
 - Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the Macedonian language be used in Government multi-lingual publications and be taught in secondary schools and tertiary institutions.
 - Mr Kerin—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.
 - Mr O'Neil—from certain citizens praying that approval be given for construction of an overpass at the railway crossing on Highway 1, near Port Augusta, S.A.
 - Mr Reeves—from certain residents of the Northern Territory praying that the transcontinental (north-south) railway be commenced and completed at an early date.
