- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

 - Mr Beddall, Dr Everingham and Mr Gayler—from certain residents of Mackay, Qld, praying that the Mackay Directory Assistance Centre not be closed.
 - Mr Beazley—from certain residents of Western Australia praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.
 - Mr Brumby—from certain citizens praying that an attendant care allowance for disabled persons be introduced immediately.
 - Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the findings of the Major Airport Needs of Sydney Committee be endorsed and proposals for an airport at Scheyville, N.S.W., be rejected.
 - Mr Dobie—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of oil exploration within the Great Barrier Reef region and that the entire region be declared a marine park.
 - Mr Fry—from certain citizens praying that the construction of Radford College, A.C.T., proceed and that a basic education grant be provided for all Australian children.
 - Mr Maher—from certain citizens praying that the Broadcasting and Television Act be amended in relation to program standards.
 - Mr O'Neil—from certain citizens praying that approval be given for construction of an overpass at the railway crossing on Highway 1, near Port Augusta, S.A.
 - Mr Reeves—from certain residents of the Northern Territory praying that the transcontinental (north-south) railway be commenced and completed at an early date.
 - Mr Scott—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the Parliament require General Motors-Holden to continue its operations at the Woodville plant, S.A.

WILLIAMTOWN, N.S.W.—F/A 18 HORNET FACILITIES-DEVELOPMENT—APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr Hurford (Minister for Housing and Construction), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Works Committee Act 1969 and by reason of the urgent nature of the work, it is expedient that the following proposed work be carried out without having been referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works: R.A.A.F. Base Williamtown, N.S.W.—F/A 18 Hornet facilities development tactical fighter—time critical facilities.

Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

On the motion of Mr Dawkins (Minister for Finance), the Bill was read a third time.

24 INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT AMENDMENT BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Howard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House is of the opinion that it contains inadequate provision to protect the independence and continued survival of sub-contractors".

Mr Cadman, by leave, moved the following amendments together:

Clause 65—

Page 61, line 36, proposed section 221YHA, paragraph 3 (c), omit "\$10,000", substitute "\$2,000".

Pages 76 to 79, omit proposed section 221 YHQ, substitute the following section:

Deduction exemption certificates

- "'221YHQ. (1) Subject to this section, on application in writing by a person, in a form approved by the Commissioner for the purposes of this section, the Commissioner shall issue a deduction exemption certificate under this section to the person in relation to a specified period.
- '(2) The Commissioner may refuse to issue a deduction exemption certificate to a person (in this sub-section referred to as "the applicant") if—
 - (a) the applicant is, at the time of receipt by the Commissioner of the application for the deduction exemption certificate, in default in his obligations under any Act administered by the Commissioner; or
 - (b) in the opinion of the Commissioner the issue of a deduction exemption certificate to the applicant may have the consequence of avoidance of tax on any prescribed payment to the applicant; or
 - (c) the applicant has not previously lodged an income tax return with the Commissioner.
- '(3) Subject to section 221YHS, a deduction exemption certificate remains in force during the period specified in the certificate as the period during which the certificate remains in force.
- '(4) Where a payee has properly furnished a deduction form to an eligible paying authority in relation to a prescribed payment and—
 - (a) if the payment is to be made to the payee in person—
 - (i) the payee has declared in the deduction form that a deduction exemption certificate has been issued to the payee in respect of the period specified in the declaration and has not been revoked,
 - (ii) the payee has produced to the eligible paying authority a deduction exemption certificate issued to the payee and applicable to the time when the payment is to be made, and
 - (iii) the eligible paying authority has no reasonable grounds for believing that the deduction exemption certificate has been revoked, or
 - (b) if the payment is not to be made to the payee in person the payee has declared in the deduction form that a deduction exemption certificate

has been issued to the payee in respect of the period specified in the declaration and has not been revoked,

the eligible paying authority shall not make any deduction from the prescribed payment under paragraph 221YHD (1) (a).".

Debate continued.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr Mountford reported accordingly.

Ordered—That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said committee.

On the motion of Mr Dawkins (Minister for Finance), the following amendment was made: Clause 65, page 78, before proposed paragraph 221YHQ (3) (a) insert the following paragraph:

"(aa) a reference to the Commissioner being satisfied that there is no reasonable likelihood that tax will be payable in relation to a year of income by an applicant for a deduction exemption certificate shall, in the case of an applicant being a partnership or the trustee of a trust estate, to be read as a reference to the Commissioner being satisfied that there is no reasonable likelihood that there will be any net income of the partnership or trust estate, as the case may be, in relation to the year of income;".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with an amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Mountford reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Dawkins, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
