FRIDAY, 4 MAY 1984

- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Cadman, Mr Coleman, Mr Fife and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that no further action be taken in respect of territorial or local government in the Australian Capital Territory until the findings of the inquiry into ACT finances have been made public and a further referendum of electors has been held.
 - Mr Cohen, Mr Dobie, Mr Fife and Mr Gorman—from certain citizens praying that the Sex Discrimination Bill be amended to prevent inconsistencies with the principles of justice and equality and that a conscience vote on the Bill be permitted to all Members of Parliament.
 - Mr Cadman, Mr Drummond and Mr Rocher—from certain citizens praying that chiropractic services be included in Medicare when it is introduced.
 - Mr Connolly, Mr Fife and Mr Tickner—from certain citizens praying that the nation's total dependence on God the Creator in accordance with the Constitution and the standing orders of the House of Representatives be reaffirmed.
 - Mr Blanchard and Mr Carlton—from certain citizens praying that the ban on the export of kangaroo products be re-applied.
 - Mr Burr and Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that regulations amending the Customs (Prohibited Imports) Regulations and Customs (Cinematograph Films) Regulations and the ordinance superseding the ACT Objectionable Publications Ordinance be disallowed and certain other action be taken in relation to censorship matters.
 - Mr E. C. Cameron and Mr Lusher—from certain residents of the Divisions of Indi and Hume, respectively, praying that biological control of Paterson's Curse be implemented.
 - Mr Goodluck and Mr Hodgman—from certain citizens praying that certain action be taken with respect to the classification and restriction of films, video tapes and printed material.
 - Mr J. J. Brown—from certain citizens praying that the Broadcasting and Television Act be amended in relation to program standards.
 - Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the findings of the Major Airport Needs of Sydney Committee be endorsed and proposals for an airport at Scheyville, NSW, be rejected.

Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that, when the redeveloped Brisbane Airport becomes operative, no jet aircraft use the crosswind runway and the curfew be maintained from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.

Mrs Darling—from certain residents of Queensland praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.

Mr Drummond—from certain electors of the Division of Forrest praying that reference to God and The Queen in the oath and affirmation of allegiance be retained.

Mr R. F. Edwards—from certain citizens praying that certain infertility treatments be included on the Commonwealth Rebate List.

Mr Free—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to legislate for the establishment of plant variety rights in Australia be rejected.

Mrs Kelly—from certain citizens praying that the decision to disallow provision for child care facilities in the extensions to the National Library of Australia be reversed.

Mr Moore—from certain residents of Queensland praying that no action be taken to change the national flag.

Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that proposed assets test legislation be abandoned and that action be taken to institute a retirement income policy which is fair and equitable.

Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that Medicare be reviewed.

Mr Saunderson—from certain citizens praying that ex-servicewomen who volunteered for service in the 1939-45 war but were not sent to war zones be considered eligible for defence service home loans.

Mr Tickner—from certain citizens praying that the decision to proceed with the development of uranium mining at Roxby Downs be reversed and all uranium mining and export cease.

3 PRICES AND INCOMES POLICY—REPORT BY ADVISORY COMMITTEE—PAPER AND MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Willis (Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations) presented the following paper:

Mr Scholes (Minister for Defence), for Mr Hurford (Minister for Housing and Construction), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Works Committee Act 1969, it is expedient to carry out the following proposed work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the committee has duly reported to Parliament: Upgrading of facilities for introduction of F28 aircraft, Wagga Wagga Airport, NSW.

Ouestion—put and passed.
