- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz:
 - Mrs Darling, Mr Gear, Mr Hand, Mr Lloyd, Mr Saunderson, Mr Scott and Mr White—from certain citizens praying that there be no increases in State aid to private schools and that the primary obligation to government schools be re-affirmed.
 - Mr Burr, Dr Charlesworth, Mr Dobie and Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying that regulations amending the Customs (Prohibited Imports) Regulations and Customs (Cinematograph Films) Regulations and the ordinance superseding the ACT Objectionable Publications Ordinance be disallowed and certain other action taken in relation to censorship matters.
 - Mr Blunt and Mr Moore—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.
 - Mr Burr and Mr Fife—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.
 - Mr Lloyd, Mr Lusher and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.
 - Mr Blanchard—from certain citizens praying that certain action be taken to discontinue the mining and supply of uranium.
 - Mr Blunt-from certain citizens praying that the existing national flag remain sacrosanct.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that moves to change the Australian flag be resisted.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain electors of the Division of Dawson praying that legislation allowing the import and sale of X-rated video films be withdrawn.
 - Mr Burr—from certain citizens praying that the present Australian flag, and The Queen, as head of state, be retained.
 - Mr Hand—from certain citizens praying that confectionery be exempt from sales tax.
 - Mr Hand—from certain citizens praying that the Omega base in Victoria be closed.
 - Mr Hand—from certain citizens praying that funding for the Personal Care Workers Study in Northcote, Vic., be continued without interruption.
 - Mr Hand—from certain citizens praying that certain action be taken in funding tertiary education.
 - Mr Katter—from certain citizens praying that the decision to alter the ACT Classification of Publications Ordinance be abandoned.

- Mr D. M. Cameron and Mr McVeigh—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.
- Mr Kerin—from certain citizens praying for the continuation of, and support for, existing Workers' Health Centres.
- Mr MacKellar—from certain citizens praying that no further action be taken in respect of territorial or local government in the Australian Capital Territory until the findings of the inquiry into ACT finances have been made public and a further referendum of electors has been held.
- Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying that the export of kangaroo products be banned and action be taken to prohibit the commercial killing of kangaroos.
- Mr Scott—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the Parliament require General Motors-Holden to continue its operations at the Woodville plant, SA.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

On the motion of Mr West, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

- 9 CUSTOMS DECLARATION BY HON. M.J. YOUNG—REPORT OF INQUIRY—PAPER NOTED: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister), by leave, moved—That the House take note of the report by Mr M. E. J. Black, QC, dated 17 August 1984, of an inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the making of a customs declaration by the Hon. M. J. Young, MP, on 5 July 1984, presented to the House on 21 August 1984.
 - Mr Peacock (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "this House deplores—
 - (1) the failure of the Prime Minister to observe required standards in not immediately dismissing the Special Minister of State;
 - (2) the failure of the Minister for Industry and Commerce to conduct a competent inquiry into the Special Minister of State's breach of the law;
 - (3) the failure of the Special Minister of State to resign his office after breaking the law:
 - (4) the attempt by the Prime Minister to delay any investigation into this matter, and
 - (5) the failure by the Prime Minister to set up an inquiry into the Special Minister of State's conduct which would have the necessary powers and brief to fully investigate the conduct of the Minister and that of the Prime Minister, and the Minister for Industry and Commerce in their attempts to cover up the matter".
